TO SPLIT DIOCESE OF PETERBORO.

Northern and Western Parts to be Cut Off—Is at Present Too Long.
An authoritative announcement has been made to the effect that the Roman Catholic Diocese of Peterboro, in which Lindsay is included, and which is at present one of the largest in Ontario, is soon to be divided. It extends from Peterboro on the east to Thunder Bay on the west, and to all more than 800 miles in extent. This is under the care of Bishop O'Connor, of Peterboro. It is proposed to cut off the northern and western part, and the new diocese thus created will probably be in charge of Rev. Father Scollard, of North Bay, who was connected with St. Peter's church in Peterboro for several years.

TAKING THE BODY HOME.
Remains of Former President Kruger Beach Rotterdam on Monday.

Set Up For Trial.
Ingessoll, Oct. 27.—In the police court yesterday afternoon, Mrs. William Dee was given her preliminary hearing on the charge of murdering her husband. After the evidence had been taken, which was much the same as that given at the inquest, the magistrate sent the prisoner up for trial at the spring assizes, which will be held at Woodstock, and J. L. Patterson, Ingessoll, defended.

Demanded For Canadian Notes.
Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Edgar Tripp, Canadian commercial agent in Trinidad, writes to the department here saying that there is a market for Canadian bank notes. Of \$200,000 worth imported last year, Canada got only \$50,000.

October Customs Revenues.
Ottawa, Nov. 1.—The customs revenue for October amounted to \$3,650,136, an increase of 123 per cent. over the same four weeks of 1899, when the amount was \$1,230,892. For October, 1903, the revenue was \$3,469,518, an increase of 189,608.

YANKEES WON'T HAVE THEM.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—Twenty Nova Scotia gypsies were up before Judge Fortier yesterday morning under a writ of habeas corpus. They had been deported, and then came back to Canada. They were detained on the Ionian under orders from the C.I.P. who opposed the writ of habeas corpus, claiming that the people were gypsies of notorious character, who lived by fortune-telling and robbery. This the people denied. Their quest came down from Boston in an effort to release them, but the case was delayed until today, pending word from the department. The judge ordered the women and children to be released under \$1,000 cash bail. The queen at once produced \$500 in American eagles, but the party had not the cash to make up the balance, and will have to remain on the Ionian until today.

ENGINEER DAUPHIN KILLED.

Winnipeg, Nov. 1.—A small wooden trestle, twenty-five feet long, crossing a creek near Canmore, B.C., and built for the C.P.R., collapsed on Saturday night, as a freight train was crossing, and tumbled. Engineer J. Dauphin, in his death, was killed. The engine was on the trestle, and it was the weight of the train that caused the accident. The engine was damaged, but the train hands escaped injury.

Politics in a Nutshell.
Premier Laurier arrived at Quebec Sunday from Three Rivers, and spoke Monday at Grand Mere with Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick. The Premier is suffering from a cold. He returns to Quebec today, and will be at Chateau Frontenac until after the election. It is probable that the elections in Quebec County will have to be postponed on account of the sudden illness of L. A. Rousseau, who is said to be dying. The act provides for such an emergency.
