## THE TERMS SETTLED

Anglo-Russian Convention rathe North Sea Outrage.

IT COVERS NINE ARTICLES

Commission Under the Convention W Il Sit in Paris Probably Within a Fortnight-Five Members Will Compose the Body-Latest Russian Story ia Plea of Their Contention-

Jap La nial. St. Petersburg, Nov. 7 .-- Russia has accepted the telegraphic draft of the Anglo-Russian convention for the commission of inquiry into the North Sea incident submitted to Itussia Wednesday, as announced in these despatches at the time, and the final exchanges will be ratified in London. The convention covers six articles. The commission will sit in Paris, and will consist of five members, Russian, British, American and French. Broad outlines for the inquiry are laid down by the convention.

convention agreement on the constitution of the commission as described by articles 9 to 14 of The Hague peace convention to investigate the North Sea incident are as follows: Firstly-The commission is to consist of five members, namely, officers of Great Britain, Russia, the United States and France, these to select a fifth. If they cannot agree upon a choice, the selection is to be entrusted to the sovereign of some country to be chosen by Great Britain and

The terms of the Anglo-Russian

Secondly-The commission is to report on all the circumstances relating to the disaster and to establish the responsibility. Thirdly-The commission to have

the power to settle all questions of Fourthly-The parties to bind themselves to supply the commission with all the necessary information, Fifthly-The commission to meet in

Paris so soon as possible after the Sixthly-The report of the commission to be officially communicated to the respective Governments. Provisions are to be added regarding the assessors and agents' expenses, a decis-

ion to be reached by a majority, etc.

It is expected that the commission will assemble in about a fortnight. Three Additional Articles. Sir Charles Hardinge, the British Ambassagor, yesterday submitted to Foreign Minister Lamsdorff three additional articles of the Anglo-Russian Convention agreement, the first mission shall be binding.
