ation of the Pests. The presence of parasites is one of the primary causes of unprofitablepess and disease in a flock of poultry man to examine his birds Ottawa. The fowls are rarely evamined, and the reason of their poor condition is not discovered or even considered. There it will pay every poutry man to examine the birds carefully before they go into winter quarters, as their health and comvermin. There are three distinct groups of parasites preying upon the domestic flowl,-fleas, lice and mites. Groups of Parasites .- Only one spe-

cies of flea, the bird flea lives upon the fowl.
