sel's Capitulation.

In the Ten Days' Fighting On the Shakhe River-Armies in Battle Array Against Each Other, But Doing Little But Sharp Outpost Work - Japs Sparing Their Ammunition.

London, Nov. 12 .- No confirmation has reached London of the rumors current on Nov. 10 of the capitulation of Port Arthur, that General Stoessel was asking for an armistice, etc. According to The Daily Telegraph's Chee Foo correspondent, Japan has consented to open the Port of Antung to steamers chartered by silk merchants when the latter obtain special permits. This action is due to China's protest that exclusion of neutral shipping would ruin the silk trade. Loss At Shakhe River.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 12 .- A corrected list of the ten-day battle of Shakhe River, issued by the War Office, places the total of killed and wounded at 33,250, of whom 900 were officers.

JAPS SPARING AMMUNITION.

Which Indicates Beilef in Big Battle Be

fore Winter Yet. Mukden, Nov. 12.-The positions of the armies on both sides remain little changed, though there is continual skirmishing going on with the object of securing minor positions tending to strengthen the respective lines of defence. The Russian scouts ! are very daring in secretly reconnoitering the whole of the Japanese line, some even creeping up to the Japanese trenches and lying concealed there all day and returning at ed in many places double and even triple and quadruple lines of trenches, wire entanglements, mines and pits. A Cossack patrol on Nov. 10 penetrated as far as Sandiapu, where they inflicted a blow against a large force of Japanese and then returned rapidly to the Russian main line without loss. A patrol also got in the rear of two Japanese companies moving to attack a Russian position. The Cossacks defeated the Japanese and returned safely to the

Russian line. An artillery fire from both sides is continued at intervals. It is heavier on the Russian right wing, where all day on Nov. 9 and also during the night the Russians shelled the Japanese positions with their heavy guns. Neither side on that date gained any advantage.

Gained Great Advantage. As a result of the heavy bombard ment by the Russians the Japanese have withdrawn some of their batteries from the advanced positions. It is believed that not being ready to attack, they are falling back to the hills. The Russians gained a great advantage when towards the end of the battle on the Shakhe River they

During Thursday night Russian volunteers dislodged a detachment of Japanese infantry from trenches in front of Lone Tree (Poutiloff) Hill. The Japanese continue to show activity on the left flank, without, however, engaging in any serious movement.

Comfortable dugouts are being built along the Russian lines, and the soldiers seem to think that they will winter where they are. The idea that Field Marshal Oyama contemplates an attempt to take Mukden is not generally entertained. Both sides seem to be content for the present with a suspension of hostilities. Warm clothing is being distributed among the troops.

CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

Details of the Re-count of Ballots At Leadon-Deputy-Returning Officers, Charged With Having Eliminated Names From the Voters Lists in St. Benitace and Tyndal, Re-

London, Ont., Nov. 12.-The net result of the re-count of ballots cast in the Federal election in this city on the 3rd instant, which closed before Judge MacBeth last night, is that Mr. Gray, the Conservative candidate, gains two votes, which reduces Mr. Hyman's majority to 21. Two ballots were added to Mr. Hyman's total and two struck off, while three were added to Mr. Gray and one struck off. On fifteen ballots judgment was reserved. Ten of these are claimed by Hyman and five by Gray. Argument will be heard on these this morning, but, whatever way they go, the result cannot be affected. Hon. C. S. Hyman is member-elect. The recount was conducted in secret, according to law, the successful and defeated candidates being represented by counsel. It is reported that in the seventh division of the Third Ward it was found that three ballots which had been marked for Gray had subsequently been spoiled by someone marking a cross opposite Hyman's name. It is alleged by the Conservatives that in this division the figures given out to the press by the poll clerk were 98 for Gray and 103 for Hyman. Later the deputy returning officer telephoned a correction, which reduced Gray's total to 95. In another division, it is asserted by the same authority, in the case of two ballots marked for Gray, but which the voters had inadvertently torn in two, only the Hyman half unmarked was found in

the ballot-box. Deputy Returning Officers Remanded. Winnipeg, Nov. 12 .- The deputy returning officers of St. Boniface and Tyndal, who are charged with having eliminated names from the voters' lists in readjusting the boundaries of polling subdivisions, were before the Magistrate yesterday, but were again remanded.
