LINDSAY'S WATER.

Opinion of a Leading United States Expert.

QUALITY BAD—PRESENT SYSTEM OF FILTRATION IMPERFECT.
We advise the installation of a Mechanical System at a Cost of About \$20,000.
Below we present the first portion of the report of Mr. Robert Spurr Weston, of Boston, Mass., the eminent expert engaged by Lindsay Water Commissioners to examine the present system and advise as to its betterment.

October 22, 1904.
The Honourable Board of Water Commissioners for the Town of Lindsay, Ontario.
Gentlemen,—At your request, the writer visited Lindsay on September 23rd and made an inspection of your water supply. You requested information concerning the character of the water supply and the most feasible methods for its improvement and protection. The results of the study are embodied in the following REPORT.

Population.—On the accompanying blue print is plotted the population of Lindsay for various years previous to 1904, and the estimated population to 1920. It will be seen that the population increased 63 per cent. between 1890 and 1900, and 11.1 per cent. between 1890 and 1904. While the rate of increase shows no signs of diminishing, phenomenal growth is not to be expected, and the writer believes that a population of 10,000 will not be reached until twenty years have passed, and that in 1920 the population will be less than 9,000.

Consumption of Water.—The consumption of water at the present writing is about 430,000 gallons per diem of which 200,000 gallons are consumed by the Grand Trunk Railway. This is at the rate of 67 gallons per capita. In 1902 the per capita consumption was 60 gallons, an increase of nearly 40 per cent. within two years.

Quantity of Water Required.—At the maximum, the consumption of water should not exceed 80 gallons per capita, and in this estimate the quantity of water in the industrial purposes is increased to 250,000 gallons per diem on account of the entrance of the Canadian Pacific Railway into the Lindsay area.

Character of Lake Scougou Water.—The water supplied to Lindsay, from the outlet of a shallow lake, is somewhat colored and is objectionably turbid. During part of the year it abounds in algae and other aquatic plants which give rise to disagreeable odors and tastes.

The water contains excessive amounts of organic matter, and a lowering analysis by the Provincial Board of Health will show. The samples were collected on March 24, 1904, and the results are expressed in parts per million.

The King of Clothiers.
Passing of One of the Old Pioneers of the Township of Ops.
Robert Reynolds, the subject of this sketch, was born in Tipperary, Ireland on Sept. 23rd, 1812, and died on Nov. 15th, 1904. He came with his parents to Canada in 1834. Four years later, he was united in marriage to Ann Blackwell, who predeceased him. He had four children, two of whom were born five years and three daughters, six of whom survive him. They are John, of South Ops, Mrs. James Lindsay, Mrs. John Armstrong and Mrs. Joseph Wilson, all of town, Robert, who predeceased the father, about twenty-one years, and another son, who died in infancy.
Mr. Reynolds was a thoughtful observer of passing events and was blessed with a good memory. He was ready to converse about the early pioneer life, remembering events as though of recent date. He always took great pride in counting up his grand and great-grand children, who numbered in all sixty-one, there being thirty-six grand-children and twenty-five great-grandchildren. The last six years of his life were spent with his son John, and family, from whom he received every possible kindness and attention.
The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Philip, the palmer, being his six grandsons named, George, Charles and Marshall Lindsay, Robert Wilson, Hilliard Armstrong.
