Exactly Wias.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—Ex-Crown Prosecutor J. P. Cooke yesterday morning dropped his proceedings for criminal libel against William Blackely of Toronto, thus ending one of the most famous cases in Montreal's criminal records. The original hearing lasted nearly 30 days, and cost each party about \$20,000. Since then a royal commission was appointed to enquire into Mr. Cooke's conduct in the matter, whose report is now before the provincial Attorney-General, Hon. Horace Archambault. Yesterday morning Mr. Cooke's counsel announced that he would not proceed with the case, in view of the matter being dealt with by the royal commission. Blackely accused Mr. Cooke, then Crown prosecutor, of accepting bribes.

General Andre Goes Under.

Paris, Nov. 16.—The official announcement is made of the resignation of General Andre, the War Minister, and the nomination of M. Henry Maurice Bertheaux, member of the Chamber of Deputies, from the Versailles division of the Seine-et-Oise, to succeed him.

LORD MINTO LEAVES CANADA.

Quebec, Nov. 19.—Amid the booming of cannon and the cheers of an immense crowd, which thronged Dufferin Terrace, overlooking the Allan Line wharf, and also along the route of the procession, and at the wharf itself, Lord Minto and the viceregal party left Quebec per S.S. Tunisian at 9 o'clock last evening. The viceregal party left the Chateau Frontenac at 8 o'clock. A guard of honor of 100 men, furnished by the Eighth Royal Rifles Regiment, was drawn up outside the hotel. The viceregal party were accompanied by Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier, Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, Premier Parent, Sir H. Montague Allan, Andrew Allan, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, D. Peltzinger and many others in carriages. The Queen's Own Canadian Hussars provided an escort of 14 men, while in honor of the Royal Canadian Regiment, together with the State band, were drawn up.

He Will Hang.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—Unless his sentence is commuted by the Dominion Government, Antonio Giacomoni of this city will be hanged on Jan. 20 for the murder of Theodore Duval on Aug. 20. On that date Giacomoni shot and mortally wounded Duval during a row in a saloon on Notre Dame street. Giacomoni's trial, which has been in progress in the Court of King's Bench for some days, came to an end last evening, when the jury brought in a verdict of guilty, with a recommendation to mercy. Judge Hall sentenced the prisoner to be hanged on Jan. 20.

PRAIRIE FIRES RAGE.

Wide Area Swept By Flames in the Northwest Territories.

Moosejaw, N.W.T., Nov. 19.—A destructive prairie fire is burning in the Wood Mountain and Willow Bunch district. The fire started somewhere in Montana, passing within 60 rods of the N.W.M. Police Barracks at Wood Mountain. Sweeping on through the country, it passed through the Willow Bunch district, and is still burning. It has covered an area about 60 miles east and west and 50 miles north and south. Everything in its path is consumed. The amount of damage at Willow Bunch will possibly reach several thousand dollars.

Prairie Fires Rage.

Lethbridge, N.W.T., Nov. 19.—Destructive prairie fires are raging northeast of here. The following losses have been reported: James Ashcroft's house and ranch building, Leadbeater's barn and haystacks, Samuel Young's ranch and buildings. The fire is now in the vicinity of Taber.

What Toronto Best.

Boston, Nov. 19.—Contributions aggregating \$15,000 to the Irish Parliamentary fund have been forwarded to Ireland from this city by the United Irish League within a week. The amount included \$12,000 from Philadelphia and \$1,311 from sympathizers with the home rule movement in Toronto, Ont.
