HORSE BREEDERS MEETING

GOVERNMENT INSPECTORS DELIVERED ADDRESS.

Beneficial Discussion Regarding Best Types of Sires, etc.

Evening Post of Nov. 1. A meeting of those interested in the breeding of horses, was held last evening in the Council chamber, and was fairly well attended. Among those present were noticed Senator McHugh, Mayor (Vrooman and Messrs. Irwin, Gostlin, McQuade, Mitchell, Channon, Blackwell, Taylor, Dege and others.

Mr. W. Channon, of Oakwood, occupied the chair, and in his opening remarks stated that the meeting was held for the purpose of giving information to the Department of Agriculture to guide them in framing legislation to endeavor to improve the condition of the horse product of Canada. He then introduced Mr. Clark, representing the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Clark gave an outline of the work that had been done so far and asked the opinions of those interested in the following questions:

1. Is Government inspection desirable?
2. What class of horses can be most profitably raised?
3. Was the system of holding a high grade horse by syndicate a good one?
4. What should be the standard of stallions?
5. Suggestions which would be valuable in improving the breed of horses.

Mr. Gostlin favored having every stallion examined as to condition and pedigree and having only the high grade, the license fee to be \$100.00. He said the heavy Clyde horses were the most profitable. He thought there was little difference in regard to the quality of sires and said to the farmers would investigate the strain of the best selling sires and breed their mares to the sires they would have better grade horses.

Senator McHugh did not believe in license and examining sires, as many fine class colts came from stallions not perfectly sound. He thought the heavy horse was in demand, that light ones were profitable and he advocated the farmers and others use judgment in breeding; their mares and breed them to the same class of horses and not breed a heavy mare to a light sire or otherwise. He said the farmers should be taught to use the best horses and should breed in the same strain as their mares. If would be to their own interest.

J. B. Bege expressed the opinion that inspectors should be placed on the road to examine stallions, but not as high as suggested by Mr. Gostlin. Mr. Taylor advocated high grade stallions and thought a license was a good idea in improving the class of horses. Mr. Blackwell said both light, heavy and general purpose horses were in demand. The heavy Clydesdales are the most profitable, but the others were also in demand and good horses of each class should be got by breeding in line.

Senator McHugh—Clydesdales are favorite heavy horses but some say the Belgian draught horses are a good deal. A horse with a good record should be given the preference even though it possesses a slight blemish which would not injure the colt. A stallion inspector may condemn a good breeder for a slight blemish on an unblemished horse. Chairman Channon asked the audience to decide by vote whether a stallion should be licensed or not. He was decided in the affirmative. He said the Department of Agriculture should do something to elevate the standard of Canadian horses, but it was a very important point and he doubted if any steps would be taken for some time.

Mr. Clark, representing the government, said immediate steps were being taken to form legislation to improve the breeding of Canadian horses. Contrary to what Mr. Channon thought, the government intended to act at once. The suggestions the audience had given were thankfully received and would be presented before the department.
