BOOKS SCANNED IN ABSENCE

How the Directors Met Crisis Which Then Confronted Them on Report of Suspicious Clerks-History of the Last Days of the Ontario Bank Before Crash Came-

N. G. Bank Inspection.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—The last days in Ontario Bank history, days intervening between the time of the complete realization by the directors that a crash was inevitable, and the fateful morning on the stock exchange when the collapse of the shares conveyed to the world the knowledge, hitherto jealously guarded, within the inner circles, were made known to the public at large for the first time yesterday in the proceedings before Magistrate

Frank H. Pope, chief clerk of the head office, and most trusted of all the staff by the general manager, since it was he who was assigned by McGill to deal with his correspondence while the manager was absent, gave to light that which had, up till then, been a hidden chapter.

Crisis Confronts Directors. It was on Sept. 1, that the directors, or some of them, at least, were confronted with a crisis in the affairs of the bank. To the emergency meeting called purely on the initiative of Mr. Pope and Transfer Clerk Chenoweth, there came Directors Flett, Harcourt, Curry and Walton. President Cockburn and Director Donald McKay

were absent from the city.
If Manager McGill had not taken any vacation last summer, it is more than likely that the Ontario Bank would still be holding up its head among banking institutions. There would have been no break in the market price, no closing of the doors, and no absorption into the Bank of Montreal. Mr. McGill would still be manager, and would be free to come and go, not permitted to move about solely by virtue of \$100,000 sureties.

A Holiday Investigation. But Mr. McGill took an extended holiday during July and August, and while he was at New York and Saratoga, investigation was being made of certain large accounts in his security ledgers. For months back, Messrs. Pope and Chenoweth had nursed suspicions that had been aroused through casual glances into the accounts. In the absence of the manager, they had time and opportunity at their com-

What they discovered confirmed their belief that all was not well under the consulship of Charles McGill. A number of New York brokerage firms were debited with large amounts, had been for years; yet there was nothing to show that any securi-ties were held, or that interest or dividends had been paid. The sums totaled well on to a million dollars, and included \$485,500 debited to Ladenburg, Thalmann & Co., and \$229,000 to Cuyler, Morgan & Co.

The Directors Astounded. The directors professed themselves astounded, and would not believe. The Government report for August was prepared for signature about Sept. 10. It was agreed that it must be signed, or a premature collapse would ensue. The directors would only acknowledge suspicion, and required verification. Donald McKay had been kept in ignorance of the situation because it was thought it would prove too heavy a blow, and he signed the report, unaware, so Mr. Pope declared, of any possible falsi-In June last, by direction of the President, Messrs. Kellogg and Mor-

Then came a conference between the board and McGill, of which no details have come out, the writing off of \$816,000 as "bad debts," and the subsequent developments.

Bank Inspection N. G. Robert B. Caldwell, inspector of the Ontario Bank for years, was examined at length, and the significant facts drawn forth that there had been practically no inspection whatever of the head office books. Before two annual meetings, at least, the inspector asked McGill to allow him to look over the books. The manager put him off with excuses, and Mr. Caldwell reported so to Mr. Cockburn, who promised to see McGill. But, appar-

ently, nothing was done. The whole trend of Mr. Caldwell' inspection indicated that the system of bank inspection is of the lowest order, and some ironical comments were made thereupon by the court, who suggested inspection by the Gov-

WIND 72 MILES AN HOUR PULLMAN IN

St. Bernard, 123 Tons, Drifts Ashore and Is Burned-Crew Escaped With Great Difficulty - The Maybell Badly Buffeted-Silver Wave a Total Wreck -- Wood Brothers Also Wrecked.

St. John, N.B., Nov. 17.-In the gale which blew on Thursday night and Friday morning a number of schooners were wrecked on the Bay of Fundy coast. The wind at time reached 72 miles an hour.

St. Bernard on Fire.
The Parrsboro', N.S., schooner St. Bernard, 123 tons, from Bridgeport, Conn., for Wood's Point, N.B., for a load of grindstones, drifted ashore and caught fire in the big storm of yesterday morning in Beaver Harbor, on the Bay of Fundy coast. Capt. Magnus Benjamin says that he ran the schooner into Beaver Harbor for shelter about 2 a. m. Both anchors were let down, but both dragged and the schooner went on the rocks. The stove upset and the vessel caught fire, and the cabin, part of the stern, some sails and rigging were burned. Water poured in and all hands left the schooner. Some leaped to the rocks, but the captain left in the dory and was nearly drowned in reaching shore. The fire burned itself out. Yesterday morning fishermen boarded the schooner and Capt. Benjamin says they refused to let him aboard and claim salvage. He says the vessel is badly damaged. With the captain were his mate, his son, who acted as steward, and two Norwegian seamen. The coasting schooner Maybell, Capt. Oliver, from Shuleens for St. John, was badly buffeted in the bay, and both anchors and part of the

deckload of deals lost. Silver Wave a Total Loss. The St. Martin's, N.B., schooner Silver Wave, Capt. Goodwin, bound from a Sound port for Tynemouth Creek, N.B., was driven ashore at Sea View, near Musquash, and is a total loss. The crew of four, all told, reached shore in safety.

There is also a report that the schooner Bessie G., owned by N. Pugsley of Parrsboro', is ashore somewhere on the bay coast, but nothing could

The schooner Wood Bros., from St. John, is ashore at Spencer's Island, full of water and the cargo badly damaged. She is 68 tons, owned by Daniel Desmond and others of Parrsboro'

Two of Crew Drowned. Biddeford, Maine, Nov. 17.—The captain and cook of the two-masted schooner Marshall Gerrin of Deer Island, Maine, were drowned, and the schooner became a total wreck, in the gale Thursday night off Wood Island Light. Bodies Float Ashore.

Point Judith, R.I., Nov. 17 .- The battered bodies of three members of the lumber-laden schooner Lugano, which was wrecked on the rocks here Thursday night, came ashore yesterday. The schooner is a complete

Steamer's Rough Voyage. St. John's, I.fld., Nov. 17.—With two of her crew severely injured, her steering gear disabled, and otherwise seriously damaged, the steamer Dundee arrived here yesterday after a terrible voyage across the Atlantic. The Dunlee sailed from Dundee 12 days ago for Montreal, and the voyage was a constant battle with wind and sea.

Lashed to the Mast. Boston, Mass., Nov. 17.-False Spit, a sunken ledge near Boston light caused the wreck of the schooner Mary E. Newton Thursday night, the crew saving their lives only by lashing themselves to the mast stumps until help arrived after daylight. Capt. E. M. Aylward of Melrose and a crew of three men suffered greatly from exposure during the night, and were exhausted when rescued by a tug. Schooner In Distress.

Atlantic City. N.J., Nov. 17 .- The little Egg Harbor life-saving station, about ten miles north of here, reports a three-masted schooner, the Lydia H. Roper, anchored seven miles off shore, flying signals of distress. The schooner's sails are blowing away and the vessel lies in a dangerous position.

The Captain Was Drowned. Charlottetown, P.E.I., Nov. 17 .- The schooner A. J. McKean, sixty tons, owned by J. H. Myrick & Co., Tignish, while on her way from Tignish to Alberton, a distance of twelve miles, in ballast, was driven ashore yesterday by a terrible northeast storm on Ma-lone Point, at the entrance of Alberton harbor, and is a total wreck. She had on board Captain Desroches and three men. The captain was drowned before help could come, but the others were picked off by a seine boat in which were Captain John Champion and nine men. They were four hours in effecting the rescue, in imminent danger of their lives. Desroches was aged fifty, and leaves a widow and nine children. This is the fifth wreck Russian Peasants In Sore Straits to Offset Pangs of Hunger.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17 .- The crop reports received here from 71 provinces and districts of Russia show the yield of wheat to be 15,059,000,000 pounds and rye 38,255,000,000 pounds, which is 9,598,000,000 pounds below

Day Coach Also Leaves Rails But None Were Killed.

INJURED

Chicago-New York Express on G.T.R. Train In an Accident Near Woodstock, Ont .- Escape of the Passengers, With Injuries to a Few Only, When Possibilities Are Considered, Is Miraculous,

Woodstock, Nov. 17 .- With threequarters of an hour lost time to make up, the Chicago-New York express on the Grand Trunk, bowling along at 50 miles or more an hour, was derailed about one and one-quarter miles west of Woodstock at 4.45 o'clock yes-

The locomotive did not leave the tracks, but the coaches did. A day coach and a Pullman went over the embankment into the ditch, and the former turned over, yet not a single fatality has to be recorded, not even a very serious injury. The escape of the passengers, when the possibilities of the wreck are realized, borders on the miraculous.

The derailment occurred just west of the C.P.R. diamond. The cause is not yet ascertained. The Injured.

GAS KILLS MISS WRIGHT. Parents May Not Live - Two Sons

Deseronto, Nov. 17.-Gas escaping during the night was the cause of death by suffocation of the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wright of this town.

The family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Wright, two sons and one daughter, aged about 21, retired as usual Thursday night, the two sons sleeping in the upper flat. Yesterday morning the boys were around the house but appeared to be dazed through inhaling the gas, and it was 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon before they recovered sufficiently to realize the condition of the rest of the family. A doctor was immediately summoned, but when he arrived he found the daughter had been dead for some time; the father and mother are now in a very serious condition, with but slight hopes of their recovery. An

inquest will be held. Crushed In Brick Machine. Brantford, Nov. 17 .- Edward Gains, colored, was killed yesterday afternoon instantly while working on a brick pressing machine in the Brantford Brick Co.'s yards. The man climbed up the machine in order to see how many forms there were still to be pressed, and fell, his head being crushed between a lever and a support on the machine. No one saw the man fall. He was found very shortly afterwards and was dead.

Fatal Fall on Stairs. Quebec, Nov. 17 .- Henry Morgan, merchant tailor, Monday evening at the St. Louis Hotel, had mounted the sixth step of the steirs when he lost his balance and fell backwards. He died at midnight from concussion of the brain.

Fatally Hurt in Hunt. Ingersoll, Nov. 17.-Word was received here yesterday that Henry Herron of Avon, a short distance from here, who was injured while hunting deer near Burks Falls, was not likely to recover. Mr. Herron belonged to the Black Creek Hunting Club, of which several Ingersoil men are members.

On False Pretences. London, Nov. 17 .- In consequence of the recent action of certain agents in inducing workmen to emigrate to Canada under false representation that work was awaiting them there, whereas they were really wanted to take the places of strikers, the president of the board of trade, Mr. Lloyd-George, in the House of Commons yesterday secured the adoption of a new clause for the merchants' shipping bill, providing that anyone inducing emigrants by false representations is liable to a fine of \$250 or imprisonment at hard labor for three months for each offence.

Furniture Men Not Guilty. Toronto, Nov. 17 .- With the statement that a criminal combination had

not been shown to exist, Justice Teetzel in the assize court yesterday dismissed the charge of conspiracy to defraud the city, on which four firms of furniture dealers were being prosecuted. 
