LINDSAY'S INCORPORATED COMPANIES

What some of our concerns are doing for the town—Great Possibilities in Other Lines if Citizens Will Only Invest Small Sums in Promising Industries—Read on and Imbibe a Lesson.

As our citizens are being urged to take stock in local enterprises, with the primary object of benefitting the town in general, and secondarily, of giving them a fair return for the money invested, the fact leads us to review the experience of our present corporate industries. The Company has to-day a paid-up capital of nearly \$150,000 and a rest fund of nearly \$50,000 and has paid its shareholders dividends of five and six per cent since its inception. The expectations of its promoters have been fully fulfilled despite some ill-advised opposition from local sources, which has now died out entirely, and to-day the Company possesses the respect and confidence of the entire community. During the past five years the Company has paid in interest to depositors and debenture holders the sum of \$37,000, and to the shareholders by way of dividends \$32,725, and during the same time added to its rest fund \$19,500. These facts would seem to indicate that stock had no reason to regret it, for sales of the stock during the past two years have been made at a premium of \$5 per share.

THE LIGHT, HEAT & POWER CO.

We next take the Light, Heat & Power Company of Lindsay. To the enterprise of Messrs. Thomas Sadler, William Needler and B. F. Reesor, Lindsay owes a debt of gratitude which is now generally conceded. While the transmission of power was talked about these gentlemen invested a large percentage of their own wealth in the venture of developing power at Fenelon Falls and transmitting it to Lindsay. We are quite safe in saying, had this not proved successful, that the gentlemen composing the Company would have been financially ruined; other means of raising money would not even have

The Cornwell Brewing and Malting Company was started a few years ago, and while it does not employ many workmen, we are assured that as an investment it is yielding satisfactory returns, and diverting a large amount of money from Toronto and other dealers.

LINDSAY WOOLLEN MILLS.

The Horn Bros. Woollen Co.; While this Company placed their stock on sale to the general public, it was taken by citizens from an investment side only, and has been entirely satisfactory as such. The stock is principally held by the original members of the old firm, and scarcely comes into the hands of under consideration. We are permitted, however, to say that they paid out for wool and wages, etc., in 1905 the handsome sum of \$51,450.

This completes our list, and we feel quite sure the volume of business will be a surprise to many of our readers. We want to bring to the notice of our citizens who have some spare money that not only has the money placed in these Companies proven profitable to the shareholders, but that it has been a great assistance to the up-building of our town. It demonstrates the fact that the small amounts of the many are just as successful, if accompanied with good management, as the large amounts in one or two hands. If you are to make a Lindsay manufacturing centre we must be willing to take a little risk. There never was a time so propitious for starting enterprises to meet the demands of the great country in our new provinces, and the opportunity must be grasped now—a year or two hence will be too late. This is in the hands of the men in our midst can spare \$100 or \$200—not in the hands of the few leading business men who are striving to keep their own heads above water. Novel Plan of New York Bank.

In New York, as elsewhere, there is keen competition between banks for deposits. The latest development of this in New York is that the new night bank there now sends out an automobile carrying a big safe on three trips every night, the first at 6 o'clock to the bank's customers among retail stores, the next at 9, to theatres, and the last at 1 o'clock in the morning, to all night restaurants. Each depositor incloses his deposit in a locked box, with a deposit slip inside, the depositor having the key and the receiving teller at the bank the only other key. Among the arrangements for the protection of the bank on wheels from being seized by highwaymen and run away with, the most ingenious is that the automobile does not start with an ordinary controller, but with one with a combination, like a safe lock.

ENGLAND'S REAL SEA PERIL

CRUMBLING OF HER SHORES A GREAT DANGER.

Royal Commission Appointed to Devise a Way to Stop Ocean Ravages. So serious has the gradual but sure disappearance of England's coast line become that a royal commission has been appointed to study the matter and devise some means to stop the ravages of the greedy seas, says a London dispatch to the New York American Journal. It is known that places that were beaches a few years ago now lie beneath the surface of the ocean and that towns that once were far inland, are now lapped by the incoming tide.

Causes of erosion or encroachment by the sea have long been known in practically all portions of the English coast line, but the fact that the progress of the land-destroying ocean is going steadily on and that the island is being gradually eaten away by the hungry waves are now considered seriously. It has been found that between 1867 and 1900 no less than 182,000 acres that once were English territory have been claimed by the ocean as its bed. Moreover, the amount of annual loss is increasing from year to year, and unless something is done to stop the encroachment of the waters upon the land it can be almost calculated when England shall have ceased to exist except as a little group of rocky islets.

Startling as this may seem it is far from being a mere scientific speculation or the alarming cry of some clairvoyant, but is rather the unpleasant and serious fact that will soon, it is believed, make the savings of England from the ocean a national problem. That England might really disappear from the map of the world is a possibility that is appreciated when it is realized that all the space that is now occupied by the North Sea and the English Channel was at one time dry land.

Great glaciers that slid down on this immense territory destroyed the sea, they divided the lands and made England, but their melting and processes of deposit gave her a soft and insecure coast. The cliffs that seem impregnable fortresses are playthings to the incessant lapping of the waves. Each tide, indeed, takes a bit of England away with it. Some of the worst effects of this erosion are to be seen in Sussex, where Langney beach, just beyond Eastbourne, is actually falling into the sea. The waves have eaten into the brick foundation of the fortifications to such an extent that this once valuable piece of coast defence has been recently abandoned.

It was not so many years ago that the map of the Suffolk coast showed little bays and jutting points of land. Now for miles it is straight almost as if cut with a knife. The site of Dunwich, that once was a prosperous market town, is now far out under fathoms of water, and Easton Haven, the most easterly point in England, is far out beyond the general coast line. In the south-eastern portion of Yorkshire the greed of the sea now seems to be at its worst, for there the cliffs fairly crumble as the waves lash them. What is to be the solution of the subject is not known at this time. The commission has hardly entered into its work, but the members are determined to end the losses of territory in this way. Reclamation of land will be undertaken as well, and much of the destruction of recent years will be made up for.

Trent Canal Statistics.

Business on the Trent Canal is increasing year by year, giving color to the predictions made that when all the sections are completed the volume of local business done will be very large. Take the report of lockages at Lovreick as an example—the growth of business has been very large, as set forth in the following returns: 1898, 175 lockages; 1899, 290 lockages; 1900, 322 lockages; 1901, 415 lockages; 1902, 532 lockages; 1903, 629 lockages; 1904, 668 lockages; 1905, 719 lockages; 1906, 788 lockages. The detailed figures for 1906 are: Number of steamers 538, barges 115; rafts 135—total 788.

NEW SEAPORT FOR ONTARIO

THE DREAM OF STATESMEN LIKELY TO BE FULFILLED.

Tombekaming Northern Ry Will be Greatly Extended.

Tombekaming Northern Ry Will be Greatly Extended. Toronto Ont., Nov. 16.—The vast success which has attended the provincial railway of the Ontario government (the Tombekaming and Northern) has been so great since the rich discoveries of silver in the Tombekaming district that there is now a movement on foot to greatly extend it. Those who are pushing the scheme for extension want the railway what they call "the backbone of the province," and the proposal is to extend it to Toronto in one direction and to Hudson's Bay in the other, thus giving the province of Ontario what has long been one of its ambitions—a seaport of its own. It is stated that the provincial life is at present hampered in the matter of making connections with other lines, and it is thought the extension to Toronto might take the shape of an agreement with the Grand Trunk people for running powers over their line into Toronto—which should prove a paying proposition for both the Grand Trunk and the government road.

At present the railway runs from North Bay to New Liskeard, a distance of about a hundred and sixty miles, and the Ontario government is engaged on the work of extending it northward, with the ultimate object of making a junction with the Grand Trunk Pacific in the neighborhood of Lake Athabasca. This extension of itself will bring the total length of the line up to 400 miles. The Ontario ministers, during their recent stay in Ottawa, availed themselves of the opportunity of renewing the request for a federal subsidy of \$8,000 per mile towards the line. This would mean a grant altogether of \$1,600,000. Mr. Fielding, the minister of Finance, promised that the request would be considered.

Galicians are Rearing Canadians.

That portion of the English press which is fond of theorizing on vast questions like the destruction of the Anglo-Saxon element in the Canadian Northwest should take comfort from the little incident that was related by Prof. Osborne, of Wesley College, according to the St. John Sun, a short time ago. It is the story of a traveller who while in the West came in contact with a Galician family. The father could speak a little English. His friend asked the name of the Galician's son. "Harry," replied the father. "And what is your daughter called?" "Clara," was the reply of the Galician. "But you are a Galician, are you not?" was the surprised query, the questioner wondering at the English names. "Yes," was the reply. "And your wife is a Galician?" "Yes," said the Galician again. "Well, are not your children Galicians?" asked the traveller. "Well," replied the Galician, "we are not raising Galicians; we are raising Canadians." There is as much illumination in a story of this kind as in a whole bushel of statistics.
