### A MODERN TARIFF AND COMMERCIAL PEACE IN CREEDS

#### Mr. Fielding's Tariff Message to the Country.

We make the following excerpts from the great speech delivered by Hon. Mr. Fielding, Finance Minister, at the banquet tendered him in Montreal, Tuesday evening, Nov. 20: "The work of cultivating peace and goodwill between the various races and creeds in our land is one which has in a very special way engaged the attention of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and nobly and successfully has he performed his task in that respect. Next to that, perhaps the most important duty that can be undertaken in connection with our public affairs is the harmonizing of the different sections of our people in settlement of the fiscal policy of the country."

and the views of the Eastern sections which has hitherto contributed so much towards the opening up of the Western country. "I think that our efforts in these directions have not been in vain. I think that most of the manufacturers of the country are disposed to recognize that the policy of a moderate tariff is on the whole a better one, even from their point of view, than a very high tariff, which would at once challenge the hostility of the greater part of our population."

"We propose a tariff, of a moderate and reasonable encouragement—protection, if you prefer the word to the industrial classes of our country. We do not desire to strike down any industry, as we have proven by our past policy. We desire a moderate and reasonable tariff which will give a measure of protection to the men who have placed their capital in manufacturing industries, but yet not be heavy enough to antagonize the great consuming masses of the country."

"It is our intention to adhere to that principle of British preference which, in the face of much adverse criticism, we laid down in 1897, and which we believe has done much for the advancement of Canada in the eyes of the Empire and of the civilized world. The degree of preference may have to be varied in some cases as compared with present rates, but the principle will remain. It will continue to be our purpose to give a substantial preference to the goods of our Mother Land as compared with the goods of foreign countries."

"Then we shall have another tariff column which shall contemplate a legitimate discrimination between the products of countries which are anxious to trade with us and the products of those countries which put up the bars against us."

"Under such conditions the adoption of the extreme protective views which prevail in some quarters would undoubtedly lead to a disturbing and perhaps dangerous agitation in the West. In many parts of the East such a policy would be no less objectionable. But I am speaking now particularly of the West, because there the agricultural industry is being overshadowed one."

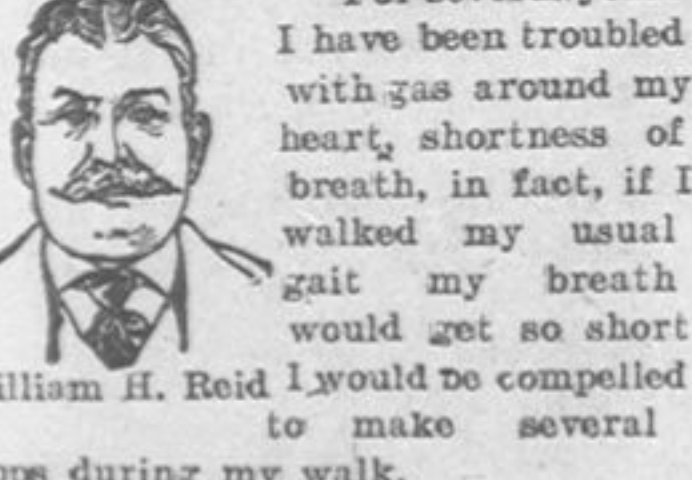

Dec. 15th.—A meeting of the Victoria Curling Club was held in Mr. D. J. McIntyre's office. Mr. Jas. Watson was elected president and Mr. S. A. McMurty, sec.-treas. The games will start as soon as the new covered rink is completed. It is high time our curlers took a high place in the annals of the Dominion; hitherto their native modesty has kept them in the background.

The skating rink is nearly finished and is an imposing structure. It is expected it will be opened on New Year's day.

The Montreal bank intends enlarging the premises of the Lindsay branch in the near future.

Mr. Louis Archambault is conducting a first-class barber shop in town at present.

### ARRESTED A CAVENDISH MAN.

Arson Charge—Sole of a Burnt Rubber Found Near Scene of the Fire. Evening Post of Nov. 22.

Yesterday High Constable Cochran, of Peterboro, went north to Gooderham, Haliburton county, to bring to the city for trial John Cochran, of Cavendish, who is charged with burning Mr. John Westlake's barns a couple of weeks ago. A telegram sent by Crown Attorney Wood, to Constable Kennedy, of Gooderham, on Tuesday, had the effect of causing his arrest.

Suspicion is said to point strongly towards Cochran, who, at the time, was staying at Mr. Windover's residence. About midnight, it was stated, he arose from his bed and was found by the following morning. Further alleged evidence which will be brought against him are the facts that the sole of a burnt rubber was found at the scene of the fire, and that the prisoner lost a rubber about that time.

Mr. Westlake lost 22 tons of hay and a number of hens. The horses were extricated from the burning building with difficulty.

### LINDSAY COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

Arrangements for 1907-Lecture Course Have Been Completed. This is the tenth anniversary of the Lindsay Collegiate Institute Lecture Course. Lindsay was the pioneer in this work, and since 1897 several Collegiate Institutes have followed her example. The citizens of Lindsay have had the opportunity of hearing many Celebrated Canadians during those ten years, and the lecture course has been praised by the press of the towns and cities of the Province.

This year the Committee are able to announce an excellent Course. It is expected that the Course will be opened on Friday, Dec. 7th, by an illustrated lecture on "Whales and Monsters of the Deep," by Prof. E. Prineo, Dominion Commissioner of Fisheries. In January Professor Dyde, of Kingston, will lecture on Shakespeare. In February Dr. Coleman, Professor of Geology in the University of Toronto, will give an address on "Mountain Climbing," in February or March, Dr. Booth, M.P. of Minnesota, will lecture on "Western Canada." It is expected that Ralph Smith, M.P. of Nanaimo, B.C., will deliver an address in the course.

It is hoped that the people of Lindsay and vicinity will, as in former years, show their appreciation of the efforts of the Collegiate Institute in bringing these distinguished lecturers to our town.

George A. Howell, of the Grip Engraving Co. of Toronto, is retiring as manager to devote a greater portion of his energy to the development of the Standard Paper Company, Limited, of Toronto, in which he has acquired a half-interest. The company, which is newly formed, will manufacture peat into cardboard by a new process, the invention of an Austrian. The Standard will locate near Pefferlaw, 54 miles from Toronto, on the Canadian Northern Ontario line, where a factory will be erected capable of an output daily of 15 tons. 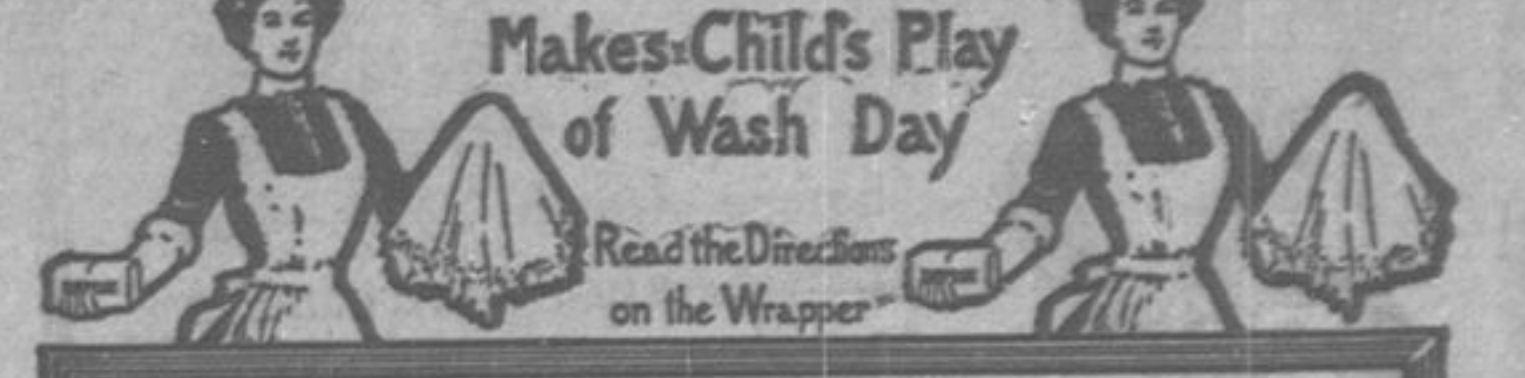
