OUR CROWING BUSINESS.

We hear a good deal from Tory papers about the increase in the national expenditure under the Liberals. It has increased very materially; but who would wish to decrease it?

And what applies to the Post Office applies to the other departments of the Government. The business has increased, and the figures of expenditure have largely increased.

But there is a twofold fact that can be applied to ascertain whether the business of the country is being well managed financially. A contemporary takes up the debt question, and finds that the net debt of Canada in 1878 when the Conservative party took office, was \$140,360,000.

the ten years from 1890 to 1900 the debt increased was \$6,445,000, the total debt being \$267,042,000 in 1900.

That is not a bad record, but the Bradford Examiner points out that a still better showing is made when we include the fiscal year just ended. It says that a short time ago Mr. Fielding was able to announce that the surplus of the past fiscal year had more than wiped out the deficit.

TO SAVE THE FISH SUPPLY.

A movement of great importance to the Province and to the Dominion at large has been inaugurated by the American Fisheries Society in calling an international convention to devise uniform regulations to save what remains of the lake fisheries, and schemes to restock them on the basis of a permanent supply, says The Globe.

The immediate cause of the present activity may be found in an address by Mr. A. Kelly Evans, who represented the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association at the meeting of the American Fisheries Society at Erie, Penn., in July last.
