CITY FATHERS MEET

Last Regular Meeting of our Councillors for 1902.

MAYOR INGLE VOTED THE CUSTOMARY HONORARIUM.

Communications and Reports.—Ald. Jackson Comments on a Statement in Aid of McDiarmid's Letter of Saturday Last—Tenders for Granolithic Walks and Stone to be Called for.

The final regular meeting of Council for the present year was held last Monday, Mayor Ingle and all members were present.

The minutes of last regular and special meetings were read by Clerk Knowlson, and on motion were confirmed.

Communications.
From F. Bartlett, Peterboro, applying for the position of Town Commissioner.—Referred to Board of Works of incoming Council.

From G. H. Hopkins, relative to Mrs. Hughes' taxes.—Laid on table.

From Mr. F. Sanford, Fenelon Falls, acknowledging receipt of Council's letter re locating his new factory in Lindsay, and promising to communicate with the town when he had formed a joint stock company.—Referred to Finance committee of new Council.

From G. H. Hopkins, secretary Water Commissioners, informing Council that a flush tank connected with Russell-st. sewer had been flowing continuously, and this waste of water should be stopped.—Town Commissioner Chalmers—"It is all right; the water was turned on only a few days ago to flush the sewer."

From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, enclosing copy of a resolution passed by the County Council on Nov. 18, 1902, protesting against the maintenance of dangerous crossing signals on Lindsay-st. and Victoria-ave.—Referred to Board of Works for 1903, Clerk to notify Mr. McNeillie that the signal complained of had been removed.

From W. L. Herriman, town physician, expressing the opinion that the opening of the Ross Hospital would not materially lessen his duties and therefore he could not consent to any reduction in his salary.—Referred to 1903 Council.—Ald. Jackson—"We had an illustration the other evening of how the Hospital will benefit us in some ways. The charge per week for a patient sent by us is only \$2.50, but we paid a bill of \$10 the other night for a patient cared for in a private house."

From B. Cook, applying for the position of Town Commissioner.—Referred to 1903 Council.

From F. K. Begbie, Waterworks Superintendent, enclosing copy of resolution passed at last meeting of Water Commissioner relative to the neglect of the firemen to notify the pump-house to shut off pressure after a fire, the result being a serious waste of fuel and unnecessary strain on the mains.—The matter was discussed for a few minutes, Ald. McDiarmid pointing out that when the automatic electric system is installed in the fire hall the departure and the return of the hose wagon would transmit the required signals.

In the meantime, in order to prevent a repetition of the blunders, Driver O'Neill will be held responsible for failure to notify the pump-house staff.

From the secretary of the Fire Brigade, submitting a list of the year's fires and false alarms.—Ald. Burrows—"The report would be much more interesting and effective if it gave the hour at which the alarm was sent in, the time the team reached the scene, and the number of firemen present."—Referred to the new Council.

Ald. Burrows moved that the Board of Health, recommending that the salary of Sanitary Inspector Douglas be increased to the old figure, \$300.—Referred to new Council.

From Jas. Butler, submitting account of sleeping accommodation for Driver O'Neill and Fireman Cotey while fire hall was under construction, 448 beds at 15c., \$67.20, and \$5 for damage done in connection with the putting in of electric signals.—Laid on table.

From Town Solicitor Hopkins, enclosing account for survey up to Dec. 1st, \$195.40; Woods Store Co., 26.25; Wilson & Wilson, \$45.—Laid on table.

A Question of Privilege.
Ald. Jackson said he wished to refer to a statement made in Aid. McDiarmid's letter in the Evening Post as it tended to reflect on some members of the Council who had supported the letting of the granolithic walks contract to Mr. Coombs. The statement was that the tender referred to was the highest price one ever let by the town. That was not correct, because in the year 1899, when labor and material were much cheaper than at present, the contract for a walk on south side of Kent-st. was let to Mr. Hayes, of Peterboro, at 15 3/4c. It was proper that explanation should be made as the letter would circulate all over the country and reflect on the Council as wishing to push through a contract that was unprofitable to the citizens. Perhaps Mr. McDiarmid had not been aware of the facts, and would now correct his mis-statement.

Ald. Burrows, "Technically Aid. McDiarmid may have erred in the matter of figures, but really he was correct. A favorable overseer could make these profits even up alright. Everything being done to excuse the contract entered into, only made things worse and in justice to all concerned it would be well to allow the investigation to proceed."

Ald. McDiarmid—"Perhaps Ald. Jackson has looked at the matter in the wrong light. The contract was for 45,000 feet at 14 3/4c. and meant an expenditure of \$7,500, which is

certainly the highest contract ever let. That was the only thing I had in mind when I made the statement." Ald. Jackson—"That is the only point I take exception to."

A Batch of Reports.
Committee reports were next taken up. Chairman McDiarmid read Reports Nos. 17 and 18 of the Police and Lighting committee; Chairman Hore, No. 30 of the Town Property committee; Chairman O'Reilly, No. 32 of the Board of Works; and Chairman Jackson, No. 18 of the Finance committee. All were adopted.

Ald. Burrows took exception to the amount paid to members of the Court of Revision for the reason that it impinged upon that should have been left for next year's Council. The sum was much larger than last year.

Ald. Jackson—"The Court had to sit earlier this year. I wasn't a member last year."

Ald. Burrows—"Ald. O'Reilly has been on for two years."

Ald. O'Reilly—"I didn't want to be a member this year, but I was put on. We had to choose between Ald. Burrows and Ald. McDiarmid, and because he was left off he squealed. He hankers after the money—there's the rub."

Hotel Licenses to be Cut.
Ald. McDiarmid gave notice of his intention to introduce a by-law to amend the liquor license by-law and reduce the number of town licenses to seven.

The Town Solicitorship.
Ald. Burrows moved the first reading of a by-law of which he gave notice some time ago, to repeal the by-law appointing a town solicitor. In support of his motion he quoted Solicitor Haykin's expression of opinion at the Chalmers' investigation to the effect that it was improper for a servant of the town to serve private parties also. As no member offered to second the resolution, Solicitor Hopkins is safe for the time being.

Clerk Knowlson's Comfort.
Moved by Ald. Jackson, seconded by Ald. O'Reilly, that the chairman of the Town Property committee be authorized to procure frost windows for the Clerk's office forthwith.—Carried.

Christmas Boxes.
Moved by Ald. McDiarmid, seconded by Ald. Hore, and carried unanimously, that the reporters be granted the usual honorarium, \$10 each.

Moved by Ald. Hore, seconded by Ald. Jackson, that \$25 be paid to each of the firemen, exclusive of the Chief and driver, as provided by the clause in the by-law governing practices and satisfactory work.—Carried.

Granolithic Walks Contract.
Moved by Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. Jackson, that the Clerk call for tenders for 45,000 feet of granolithic walks, same to be received up to 15th Jan., 1903.

Ald. O'Reilly explained that the object of the motion was to help matters for the new Council, when they met they would have the offers before them, and could let a contract or decide to have the work done by day labor, as deemed best. Whoever course was taken, stone and other materials would have to be arranged for.

Ald. Burrows—"I have sat in Councils before this, but never have I seen so much solicitude to pass work for the ensuing year. The quantity of field stone involved is too small to be taken into consideration."

Ald. Jackson said a great quantity of stone would be required, and carter were anxious to get to work. If the supply is deficient, and stone has to be secured from quarries at a distance the town will not get the walks built for 14 3/4c.

The resolution was adopted. Moved by Ald. McDiarmid, seconded by Ald. O'Reilly, that the Clerk advertise for the quantity of stone required for 45,000 feet of granolithic walks, tenders to be received up until Jan. 20th.—Carried.

The accounts were then passed, Mr. Butler's being reduced \$5.

The Mayor's Reward.
On motion Mayor Ingle vacated the chair, which was taken by Ald. McDiarmid. Ald. Burrows then paid a graceful tribute to the spirit of fairness and patience displayed by His Worship while presiding over the Council's deliberations during the year, and moved that he be granted the customary honorarium, and stone required for 45,000 feet of granolithic walks, tenders to be received up until Jan. 20th.—Carried.

The Mayor returned thanks in a brief speech. Perhaps he had been a little harsh in his rulings at times, but never intentionally so. The proceedings had been conducted in a very harmonious and pleasant manner, and he hoped next year's business would be transacted as smoothly.

Council then adjourned till Saturday evening at 8 o'clock, when the financial statement will be presented.
