They have visited the Home for the Aged, in which they found fifteen men and three women. The work carried on by the Board of the Home is worthy of all praise, but it cannot be admitted that the care of the destitute in this County can be permanently provided for in this institution, and the Grand Jurors are convinced that an imperative duty rests upon the County Council to provide a House of Refuge.
