THE DEER HUNTING SEASON. Detective Greer Says It Ought to be Made Two Weeks Later.

The impossibility of having the

open season for deer arranged to

meet the individual views of every hunter keeps up the controversy. Sportsmen from all parts of the Province have expressed the belief that it would be wise to have the season two or three weeks later than it is at present, as the weatherwas generally so warm that many deer killed the first two or three days were never brought out, the meat "going bad." This view of the matter is now further strengthened by the reports of Provincial Detectives Joseph Rogers and William Greer, who were on the hunting grounds to see that the laws were

hunters who have infested the regions since the first of November. Detective Greer says that the open season ought to be made two weeks later, and run from November 15 to November 30. He also says that all the deer shot during the first fer days this year, spoiled, and were never brought out. Lots of hunters, he says, killed four deer this season, the two they had killed first having gone bad, and the law allowing them to bring out two.
