**MAGISTRATE ALEX. JACKSON THE POLICE COURT FIASCO**

SWORN IN WEDNESDAY BY COUNTY CROWN ATTORNEY DEVLIN WAS CONSIDERED BY THE POLICE COMMISSIONERS MONDAY

Now Up to Chief Nevison to Summon Messrs. Hopkins and Steers

Mr. Alex. Jackson, Lindsay's new Police Magistrate, received his commission November 25th and in the afternoon took the oath of office before County Crown Attorney Devlin.

The above information will be received with a considerable display of interest by our citizens in view of the fact that the delay in the arrival of the commission has been urged as accounting for the failure to prosecute the principals in the late police court row. (We understand that friends of Police Magistrate Jackson incline to the view that he should refuse to try the case for the reason that the assault was committed some weeks prior to his appointment and in the presence of another Magistrate who has the power to act if he so desires, and who is possessed of the necessary information inasmuch as the offence was committed under his eye. At the first glance it would appear as if the new Magistrate would be justified in refusing the case. His decision will no doubt be announced shortly.)

It is reported that the Police Commissioners will meet in a few days to consider the course to be followed. Magistrate Jackson, as one of the three Commissioners, cannot very well discuss with his colleagues the sentence he may see fit to impose if he takes the case, therefore it would seem that the two remaining Commissioners might as well have debated the situation and arrived at a conclusion two or three weeks ago.

Anyway, Mayor Sootheran is pledged to take action, and that action should not be long delayed. It might be well for Alderman McCree, chairman of the so-called police committee to give the matter his attention.

Chief Nevison was asked this afternoon by our representative if he had any intensions against the parties. His answer was brief and to the point—"No!"

**SECRECIES IN POLICE CIRCLES.**

There is one department of the city government which is conducted in secrecy, that is the Police department. The Board of Police Commissioners is composed of the County Judge, the Police Magistrate and the Mayor. These have, or are said to have, meetings at stated intervals, when matters pertaining to the force are discussed and disposed of. But no public notice is given of these sessions, and none of the public are admitted. Now, it may be that the affairs are properly conducted, and the highest efficiency of the force, with the minimum of expense to the public, is attained by the management. But it is to be remembered that the police are paid by the people, and the people who pay the bill should know in detail, from time to time, how the money is spent, and what they are getting for it.
