objects and methods in brief; First,-People's Veto: That any by-law or resolution relating to certain important subjects specified below shall wait twenty days in the Town Council between second reading and coming up for third reading. If during that time 15 per cent of the electors by petition ask for its submission to the popular vote it shall be so submitted, and the decision of the voters shall be obeyed by the al-

Second .- Following out the subjects above mentioned to which the People's Veto can be applied : Granting almending and renewing Franchises; Application for Legislation to change the Town Government Application for Legislation to raise 312, Josephine Grozelle 300, Kathleen money; Changing sites for public taxation; Large expenditures of money; Choosing sites for Public buildings.

Third .- The Direct Initiative; That if 20 per cent of the electors by petition present to the Town Council any by-law or resolution that they desire the passage of, and Council declines to pass it, then it must be submitted to a vote of the people not later than the next municipal election, if presented in time, and the aldermen must obey the will of the voters as expressed at the polls.

Fourth. - Pledges asked; Every candidate will be asked to pledge himself to use the power of his office, if elected, to obtain the adoption of Initiative as above, by promoting the passage of rules of proceedure in the Town Council and by his own individual action in the Council.

ARIO FARMERS.

Fewer Chattel Mortgages-Report of the Bureau of Industries Just Received-The Value of Live Stock and Farm Property - Decrease in Cheese Factories-Increase in Output.

A significant reduction in the number and amount of chattel mortgages given during the past year in the province is contained in the report of the Bureau of Industries issued satisfaction, recently.

Last year, in spite of the growth in business, 15,826 chattel mortgages were recorded, as against 21,-789 seven years ago. Since 1895, the number of chattel mortgages given in the province has been steadily deoreasing, and the amounts borrowed have shown a similar shrinkage. For instance, last year the mortgages for your next stove. registered represented loans of \$11,-989,000, while in 1895, when the volume of business was considerably less, the loans on mortgages amounted to \$13,561,716. Nearly \$1,500,000 of the loans last year was made to railway and lumber companies.

The number of chattel mortgages registered against farmers last year was 7,235, the smallest in ten years at least. The aggregate of these mort-"The rule of the majority instead gages was \$2,850,000. In 1895; the mortages were 12,288 over more than last year, and the amount of money borrowed was correspondingly greater,b eing \$3,767,626. The value of the live stock sold in

the province during the past year crease of nearly seven millions upon the previous year, the totals of which represented an increase of five mil- our line. lions on those of 1900. Farm lands in Ontario since the end of 1901 have appreciated in value by over nineteen millions of dollars. Farm buildings do not show the same increase, although there has been an increase of over eleven million dollars.

The farm property, including land buildings, implements and stock, is now worth a billion of dollars, the exact valuation being \$1,044,894,332. Farm property appreciated over forty three millions in 1902. Farm property values were at their lowest ebb in 1896, when the totals were some \$910,291,623. Up to 1896 there had been four years of steady depreciation in value, but since that time the gains have been rapid and well sustained.

The number of cheese factories has decreased by fifty, but the utmost increased by twelve million pounds. worth over two million dollars While the number of patrons was reduced by over four thousand, three mullion dollars more were paid to them un average increase of ten cents, per hundred pounds of milk being given.
