'T WAS A WILD STAMPEDE.

A Threshing Outfit Caused Trouble at Ops Swing Bridge on Saturday.

Most horses look with distrust upon the steam thrasher's outfit, and when Mr. Joe Traynor was heading south Saturday evening in the vicinity of Ops swing bridge he became aware that about a dozen farmers' rigs were hanging back until a favorable opportunity to pass him presented itself. He at once shut off steam, and the procession passed in safety until a young and mettlesome horse driven by Mr. John McGahy, caught sight of the engine, and escaping steam. Then there was trouble. In less time than it takes to tell the rigs seemed to be locked together in an inextricable mass. When the knot was untied it was found that Mr. McGahy's rig was wrecked, having been overturned and trampled upon, and that his young son, who remained in the vehicle when it upset, had narrowly escaped suffocation, his head having been forced out through one of the openings in the carriage top.

Death of Mr. John Hillock.

A number of our citizens read with regret the announcement in Tuesday's papers of the death of Mr. John Hillock, of Toronto, father of Miss Julia Hillock, Modern Languages teacher on the staff of our Collegiate institute some five or six years ago. Mr. Hillock passed away Sunday at Pentanguene, in his seventy-first year. He was born in Toronto in 1834. In 1865 he, in conjunction with the late J. J. DELAYED LETTERS.

Department Wants to Find out the Cause of Trouble.

The Post-office Department has issued the following notice, which is of more than usual importance to the public: Persons who receive letters that have been misused or delayed are requested to preserve the envelopes, and send them immediately direct to the Deputy Postmaster-General, with any information in the case that may be of service to the department in making an investigation. Letters which are not registered are carried through the mails and delivered to the persons to whom they are addressed without any kind of record being kept of their delivery. The department has therefore no means of knowing how the post-offices are doing their work unless those whose correspondence is subjected to irregularities are brought to its notice. In cases of irregularities care should be taken to send the envelopes, as the post marks on the envelopes furnish evidence which enables the department to bring the circumstances home to the offenders. Any information as to postal or delivery which may be in the possession of the person complaining is also desired, since where one piece of evidence fails, another sometimes becomes effective.

Agricultural and Experimental Union

The twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union will be held at the Ontario Agricultural College on Monday and Tuesday, December 5th and 6th, starting at 1:30 p.m. on the 5th. Experiments in agriculture and horticulture have this year been conducted on the nearly 5,000 farms through Ontario. The results of the carefully conducted work will be summarized and presented at the annual meeting, to which all interested in agriculture are invited. Some of the special subjects to be presented and discussed this year are as follows: "Selection of seed corn," "How to farm successfully with as little help as possible," "The shipping of fruit in cold storage," "The farm and the home," "Farm Economy in Ontario," "Actual observations of economical methods of farm crop yield per acre of our farm crops," etc. Ladies' sessions, under the auspices of the Women's Institute, will be held in the Macdonald Institute on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. On Monday evening a public meeting of interest to all will be held at the College. Convocation will be held on Tuesday evening at the Experimental Union meeting and the Provincial Union meeting and the program rates to Guelph for the Experimental Union meeting and the Provincial Union meeting.
