LINDSAY LOCAL MINSTRELS ARE HAPPY

Bumper House at Last Week's Performance and Everybody Well Satisfied—in Some Respects the Performance Eclipsed All Past Efforts—Handsome Surplus for Treasury of King Edward Club.

Last Thursday, the footlights of the Academy of Music were graced by the appearance of the Lindsay Local Minstrels, and once more Lindsay's great annual amateur performance has come and gone, leaving behind a glowing record in the minds of scores of people. As usual the house was packed to the doors, every available seat being occupied, and chairs and standing room were sold to anxious ones.

This year a complete change in the outward appearance of the Minstrels made a decided improvement and hit. Instead of the old-time burnt cork and charcoal mixture, the faces were left to Nature's hands and the Minstrels, all dressed in black, with light blue trimmings, or bands on the cuffs and collars of the coats, and white powdered collars, sitting on a strikingly decorated stage of handsome rugs, palms and ferns, made a grand appearance and a vast improvement over former years. The chorus was not quite as large as that of a year ago, but all present sang with a lusty vim that brought forth hearty applause. Many new faces were enrolled this year, the most noticeable being that of the interlocutor, Dr. F. A. Walters. Many were wondering who would take the place of Mr. T. W. Greer, the boys' interlocutor in years past, but Dr. Walters took his part with an experienced touch and ease, speaking in clear tones.

Of the six of last year's end men, only three were noticed this year, viz., Messrs. Fullerton, Simpson and Meehan, the five new ones being Messrs. W. Shelton, D. Paton, J. Gray, B. Naylor, and A. Parkin. The funny end men, who were attired in the German band costume of laughable cut and style, with black faces, acted their parts with accuracy and displayed less of the "bung" element of previous performances. The programme was bubbling over with catchy musical numbers and bright, sparkling comedy, with bits of local interest. The programme was refreshing and not overdone, and rippling with laughter and applause were always in readiness. INFANTS TO BE VACCINATED.

LAW REQUIRES THAT THIS BE DONE EARLY IN LIFE.

Condensation of Health Act Showing Persons Entitled to Perform the Operation.

At present, when there are a number of smallpox outbreaks throughout the province, it has been found that many people are quite ignorant of the law regarding vaccination. For this reason the following brief condensation of the provisions of the Act in that regard has been prepared and given to the public by Dr. C. A. Hodgkins, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health.

The Public Health Act requires that parents should present the child within three months after birth for vaccination to the officers appointed by the municipality or to a registered medical practitioner, or to the hospital authorities. It further provides that in the eighth day thereafter the child shall be brought again to the doctor so as to permit of verification of the vaccination.

Another section of the Act requires the physician to perform the vaccination and to give a certificate of the same to the parents, that is if the vaccination is successful, and to send a duplicate to the clerk of the municipality.

FREE VACCINATION OF POOR.

In regard to an appointment of vaccinators, trustees of hospitals must keep a supply of vaccine. In addition they must be prepared to vaccinate the poor, free of charge, and all others at a maximum fee of fifty cents. So far as Dr. Hodgkins is aware there is no hospital in Ontario which carries out this section. The Councils of all municipalities, cities, towns, townships, and incorporated villages are required to contract with a medical practitioner for one year to vaccinate, at the expense of the municipality, the poor free of charge, and other applicants at 50c. each. Local Boards of Health are empowered to do this in case the Council takes no action. Neglect on the part of parents to have children vaccinated renders them liable to a fine not exceeding five dollars. This fine may be remitted in case of failure to perform the operation.

According to section 16 of the Act, it is lawful for the trustees of any Public or High school to provide that no pupil shall attend without producing a certificate of successful vaccination.

In the event of an outbreak of smallpox in any locality it is further provided that the Medical Health Officer, with the approval of the local Board of Health, requires a certificate of vaccination from all students of High schools, Collegiate Institutes and universities.

There are three classes of certificates that may be given by a physician. One of these is vaccination. The second proves unfitness for vaccination. This postpones to a certain date the time for the performance of the operation. The third proves insusceptibility to the vaccination virus.

In case persons, either residents or non-residents be infected with smallpox the Public Health Act provides that the municipality shall make provision for the isolation and care of the patients. This does not imply that the corporation shall bear the whole expense, for the law says that this shall be done at the cost of the person affected or the persons liable for his support. Only in the case of poverty is the municipality bound to pay the expense out of the general funds.
