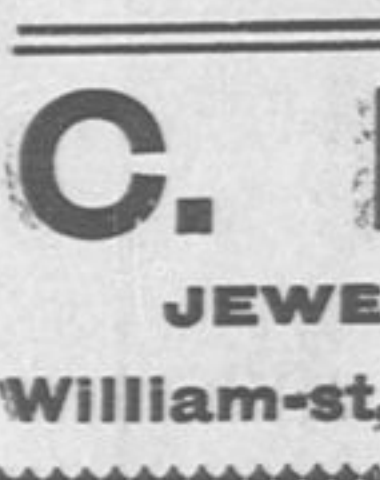

"WHERE IS WATERWORKS SURPLUS?"

Various Matters Dealt With at Monday Night's Meeting of Council--Market Butchers Will be Permitted to Offer Unsold Portions of Quarters of Beef Cut for Their Regular Customers.

Our Town Fathers met in regular monthly session last Monday in the Clerk's office, the chilly temperature of the large hall -- the usual meeting place -- being too suggestive of "cold feet" and other unpleasant possibilities. The members present were Mayor Vrooman and Aldermen O'Reilly, Reg. Maunder, Bezz, Eyres and Fisher.

The minutes of the last regular and two special meetings were read and confirmed.

THE FIRE BY-LAW. On motion Mr. Jas. Boxall was heard in connection with a storage building which Mr. E. Neill wishes to erect in the rear of his store for the reception of empty cases. Mr. Boxall pointed out that the building was being covered with corrugated iron, and as it would not be sheeted inside with wood, would be practically as safe as a cement building.

On motion of Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. Fisher, the required permission was granted subject to the usual regulations.

COMMUNICATIONS. From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk and Treasurer, advising Council of a change in the method of committal of persons to the County House of Refuge.--Fyld.

On his line, causing his fence to fall. Obnoxious garbage had also been deposited in the abandoned pit, and he asked that the undesirable condition of things be remedied.--Referred to Board of Works, with instructions to report at next meeting.

From Hon. Mr. Emerson, acknowledging receipt of memorial forwarded by Council respecting Trent Canal levels.--Fyld.

From McLaughlin & Peel, enclosing draft of Waterworks by-law for \$20,000.--Laid on table.

From Mrs. Mary Hand, respecting the remission of her taxes.--Finance committee.

From Town Clerk, St. Thomas, proposing an assessment convention to frame suggestions for submission to the Legislature.--Fyld.

From McLaughlin & Peel, town solicitors, with reference to the settlement of the Samuel Walker suit for damages.--Fyld.

J. P. Ryley, Wilbert Hunter and several other enthusiastic poultry men, and supporters of a local show, President Ellis, the first speaker, said their mission was to ask a grant in aid of the approaching second show under the Society's auspices. The first one, held in January last, had been very successful, and the Society felt encouraged to proceed. Their request for another grant looked like asking for two in one year, but the money would not be required before the date of the Show, in January, and if they were refused assistance they might have to abandon the scheme. Everyone who took note of the business being done by Flavalle Limited at the present time would be able to realize to some extent the increasing importance of the poultry industry to the people of the County. The County Council had given them a liberal grant in aid of the first show, and when the new body met in January another grant would no doubt be voted.

Treasurer Jordan, read the financial statement of the last show, showing a balance of \$56.11 in the treasury, and referred to the liberal encouragement given to the poultry men of town and district as a result of the initial success achieved. Many exchanges of birds had been made and numbers of first-class fowl were being purchased from noted farmers and brought into town to improve existing breeds. Properly encouraged, the Lindsay Poultry Show might easily become one of the leading events of the kind in the Province.

Messrs. D. C. Trew, and Thos. Connolly were also heard, in support of a liberal grant. The former, in proof of the good work already accomplished, said that at the last show he had sold a pair of good birds to a local farmer, and only the other day he had selected from a coop of chickens sent in by the buyer to the Flavalle firm two birds fit to be exhibited anywhere. Mr. Connolly said the Association's show was a first-class school for the farmers, all of whom are becoming interested in poultry, and it provided healthy competition and the right sort of encouragement for the town's amateur fanciers and breeders.

Moved by Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. Fisher, that a grant of \$50 be made, coupled with a guarantee of \$50. Ald. O'Reilly spoke strongly in favor of the object of the Association -- Lindsay would be on a circuit of five shows, and the best birds would be exhibited here. The Government had recognized the good work Poultry Associations were doing by making a grant and promising to increase it.

Mayor Vrooman -- "I don't oppose the motion, but wish to say a few words. This is the second time this deputation has appeared before us -- the first time was early in the year, before we had passed our estimates; now they come again on the eve of our going out, and when we have made no provision for the demand, and I fail to see how we can comply with the request. You intend going back to the County Council, and I think you should extend the same confidence to the Town Council. You say the Poultry Show will benefit the farmers, while in the same breath you acknowledge that you were 'turned down' by the retiring County Council -- a body of farmers. I'm in thorough sympathy with your aims, but we have a deficit now and I don't wish to add to it."

Mr. Trew -- "It is important that our Show date be fixed and advertised in the Poultry Journal if we are to hold a show this winter."

Alderman Bezz and Reg agreed with Mayor Vrooman that it would be injudicious to make a grant -- the new Council might be depended on to do the right thing.

Ald. O'Reilly -- "The money might as well be voted now, because it need not be paid till after New Year's. We have \$100 to the good, under the heading 'deputation expenses', and it's merely a matter of bookkeeping."

Mayor Vrooman thought the deputation should not press their request, but be content to trust the new Council, which would no doubt comprise a majority of the retiring members -- if not, there was no sense in good men offering for re-election, because ever man had done his duty.

Ald. Eyres said the request of the deputation subjected Council to a good deal of pressure, because they were desirous of assisting the Association, in every way. At the same time, one's principles must be vindicated. He believed the grant would be cheerfully made by next year's Council, no matter who was elected. Personally he was strongly in favor of the grant and the good use that would support instant action but for the fact -- as pointed out by Mayor Vrooman -- that Council was closing the year with a deficit. The delay need not in any way interfere with the plans of the Association for their second show.

Convinced by the arguments of the respective speakers, President Ellis and others of the deputation expressed their willingness to exercise patience, and on motion of Aldermen Maunder and Bezz the matter was allowed to stand.

SUNDRY MATTERS. Mr. G. H. Lindsay was heard relative to plans furnished by him of sewers laid during the past season. He asked \$10 apiece for three and \$20 for the fourth, and remarked that the sewers had been built for much less money than they would have cost under contract. The \$50 item was passed.

Market Clerk Callaghan's report for November was presented as follows: Weighing fees \$6750, tolls, \$10.40; total \$7790.--Fyld.

The annual report of Lindsay Fire Brigade was referred to the Town Property committee. A lengthy report from Mrs. Sharpe, truant officer, was sent to the Police and Lighting committee. Reports of standing committees were read and allowed.

vious....After some discussion it was decided to limit the size of such unsold portions to 10 lbs. Some of the members appeared skeptical as to the possibility of determining whether the offerings were "left overs" or newly run quarters, but as the Mayor did not seem at all alarmed the discussion closed.

By-law No. 1106 dealt with the holding of the municipal elections. A meeting for the nomination of Mayor, Regs, Dep.-Revs and Aldermen will be held Dec. 31st, at 7.30 p. m., and a poll will be opened (if necessary) on Monday, Jan. 7th. The following polling places and deputy returning officers were selected: East Ward No. 1 -- Crozelle's shoe shop, Fremont's; No. 2 -- Crandall's office, J. O'Reilly, South Ward -- No. 1, Lindsay Bros.' office, W. J. Stewart; No. 2 -- Jewett's grocery office, A. A. J. Scanes; --No. 3, Tangney's house, Lindsay-st., G. C. East; North Ward -- No. 1, Market room, John Kelley; No. 2, Skitch's carriage shop, A. Palen; No. 3, Horn Bros.' office, John Smith.

By-law No. 1107 authorized the settlement of the Samuel Walker High Court suit by paying \$175 and assuming 75 feet of sewer frontage assessments.

The Waterworks by-law (to be submitted to the people) provides for raising the sum of \$20,000 for a new filtration system, necessitating a levy of \$157.53 to be raised annually for 20 years, the loan to bear 4-1-2 per cent. interest. Vote will be taken at the municipal elections.

Mayor Vrooman (to Clerk Knowlson) -- "Mr. Clerk, have you received any money from the Water Commissioners?" Clerk Knowlson -- "I haven't, Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Vrooman -- "That's strange; the Act calls on them to hand over all surplus earnings, and they report a balance to the good."

Everybody laughed, evidently looking on the whole thing as a capital joke. Some ratepayers will fail to see the point, however.

The committee then rose, after which the several by-laws were given a third reading (Waterworks by-law excepted).

SUNDRY MATTERS. At the suggestion of Mayor Vrooman, the town butchers will be furnished with copies of the Butchers' by-law.

On motion of Ald. Bezz, seconded by Ald. Fisher, the Treasurer was authorized to pay the members of the Court of Revision \$9 each for three meetings attended.

Ald. O'Reilly referred to the recent test of the town piggery by-law, which was defective because it had not been drawn up according to instructions given.

Mayor Vrooman -- "The by-law should read that no citizen shall keep more than two pigs."

Clerk Knowlson was instructed to have the necessary amendment ready for next meeting.

The members then devoted some consideration to the snow plowing question. A sample order was ordered from H. Sewrey & Co., Barrie, was damned with faint praise by Ald. Eyres and others. (The Clerk was instructed to inform the vendor that the plow was not satisfactory. In the meantime Ald. Reg will inspect the old plough and have same repaired if necessary.)
