As showing the progressive nature of the market for English wools this table gives the ruling values in cents at the beginning of June for five years, in fact since the lowest point was touched. Such a transformation has never been known in the history of the wool trade:

FORMER LINDSAY BOY IN JONES WRECK

Mr. Mervin Clark Among the Passengers on the Ill-fated Steamer engulfed in Georgian Bay on Thursday Week.

When Lindsay citizens read the sad news of the most disastrous wreck of the steamer "J. H. Jones" nearly opposite Christian Island, in Georgian Bay the other day, they little thought that among the drowned passengers was a young man well known to a host of Lindsay friends—Mr. Mervin F. Clark. Just two years ago this coming winter, Mr. Clark, known as 'Frank' to his companions, was employed as clerk in Mr. C. H. Hughson's jewellery store and spent the winter in town stopping at the home of Mrs. J. S. Moynes on William-st. He was a bright young fellow, and well liked by a large circle of young friends, and his sad end is much regretted by all who knew him. A despatch in to-day's World says: Mr. Clark, who is one of the victims of the wreck disaster in Georgian Bay, was a son of W. H. Clark, of 1178 West Queen-st., who three months ago moved here from Wiaraton. Young Clark was 21 years of age. He was in poor health and was taking the trip—his first—in the hope of improvement. He was a jeweler by trade. After leaving Lindsay Frank went to Toronto, where he for a time was employed in a leading jewellery store, which belongs to the Crawford Tag Co. of Wiaraton, left Owen Sound on her regular trip to Peninsula and Manitoulin Island ports. It was her last trip of the season and she carried a heavy load of freight, besides twelve or fifteen passengers. She was reported as passing Griffith's Island and Cape Croker Lights the same evening, and is said to have been seen on Friday off Barrow Bay. Nothing further was heard of her, though she should have called at Lion's Head, for which place she had a quantity of freight and a number of passengers. Messages were sent in all directions, but without result. The crew consisted of twenty men, all from Wiaraton. These, along with 15 passengers, are all missing. Little hope is entertained of any the bodies ever being recovered.

THE TARIFF CHANGES

British preference changed by abolition of the 33 1-3 per cent. discount on British goods and substitution thereof of a special discount for each article. In some cases preference is increased, in others it is lessened. A new schedule of duties introduced as basis of negotiations with other countries. Countries agreeing to the terms, enjoy a rate of duty in Canada halfway between the tariff proper and the British preference. Surtax on German goods continued. Clause authorizing the Government to reduce duty on articles in which there is a combine altered so as to provide that when any court finds persons guilty of combining, the Government may take action. Duties slightly reduced on reapers, mowers, binders, scythes, axes, confectionery, cardboard and gasoline, oranges and lemons. Duties increased on silverware, jewelry, clocks, watches, linotypes, telephone instruments, hats and caps, neckties, collars and cuffs, brushes, glue, perfume, brick bats, canned meats, horses, cattle, bees, peas, and vegetables.—Mail and Empire.

INJURED AT C.P.R. STATION.

Charles Scully Narrowly Escaped Death Last Saturday. Evening Post of Dec. 1st. Yesterday Contractor Wm. O'Neill commenced drawing some very heavy construction timber from the C. P. R. station to the Ops swing bridge. Mr. O'Neill has been awarded the contract by the Dominion government for the rebuilding of the swing bridge and constructing three new cement piers. He had engaged three men to help him—Mr. Jos. Meenan, drayman, and Messrs. Deyell and Chas. Scully. This morning shortly after seven o'clock Scully met with a serious accident. The men were transferring a couple of heavy pieces from the flat car to a wagon, and Deyell and Scully were doing the carrying. It happened that while Deyell was turning over his end of the huge log Scully was in the act of climbing onto the car and the log rolled down and jammed his head against another log. The accident was not noticed by his companions at the time. His face was badly crushed and bruised. He was carried into the office of Baker & Bryans and afterwards taken to the hospital in the ambulance. But for the intervention of a small log, which intercepted to some extent the downward force of the large timber, Mr. Scully might have been killed. Mr. Scully is a son of Mr. Dan James Scully, of the south ward, and is an old L. C. boy.
