## THE TARIFF CHANGES

British preference changed by abolition of the 33 1-3 per cent. discount on British goods and substitution therefor of a special discount for each article. In some cases preference is increas-

A new schedule of duties introduced as basis of negotiations with other countries. Countries agreeing to the terms, enjoy a rate of duty in Canada halfwhy between the tariff proper and the British preference.

Surtax on, German goods continued.

Clause authorizing the Government to reduce duty on articles in which there is a combine altered so as to provide that when any court finds persons guilty of combining, the Government may take action.

Duties slightly reduced on reapers, mowers, binders, scythes, axes, confectionery, cardboard and gasoline, oranges and le-

Duties increased on silverware, jewelry, clocks, watches, linotypes, telephone instruments, hats and caps, neckties, collars and cuffs, brushes, glue, perfumery, brick baths, canned meats, horses, cattle, beans, peas, and vegetables.-Mail and Empire.


