FOUND DEAD IN A NEIGHBOR'S FIELD

Aged Woman, Returning From Lindsay To Her Home, Succumbs To Fatigue and Cold and Lies Down in a Barren Field to Die—Exposed For Six Days—An Inquest Deemed Unnecessary.

Evening Post of Dec. 14.

On last Saturday, a bitterly cold day, an aged woman named Mary Heenan, who lived about six miles east of Lindsay, walked to town to do some shopping. She never returned to her home, and yesterday (Thursday) some of the neighbors found the body lying in the field of Mr. Wesley Gilson.

The deceased lived alone in a small house on a fifty-acre farm, and we understand was in rather poor circumstances; however, under no conditions would she consent to enter the County House of Refuge, although friends had continually besee

ged of her to do so. Yesterday a neighbor visited her little home and found the place empty, with no traces whatever of the recent presence of the aged occupant. He notified other neighbors and all went out in search of the missing woman.

When coming home from Lindsay she had evidently started across a field as a short-cut home, and it is surmised that owing to the effects of fatigue and cold, she was forced to rest on the hard, cold ground, as when found her basket of purchases was by her side and a small bundle rolled up under her head.

There being no suspicion of foul play, Coroner Burrows deemed an inquest unnecessary, and issued the usual certificates.

DEATH OF W. WILSON WOOD

ASSISTANT PROVINCIAL AUDITOR PASSE AWAY.

One of the Most Popular Officials in Ontario Civil Service—Old Lindsay Boy.

(Toronto Globe).

Mr. William Wilson Wood, Assistant Provincial Auditor since 1901, died at the residence of his father, Hon. S. C. Wood, 97 Avenue road, Wednesday Dec. 12th, after an illness of three months, though in the end death came suddenly. Deceased who was one of the most popular members of the civil service staff and an athletic circles in this city, was born in Lindsay in 1866. He entered the service of the Province about twenty five years ago, and was first in the Agricultural Department later being engaged on Provincial surveys, and finally about 1886 entering the Audit Department.

His service in this department was so satisfactory that he ultimately became assistant to the former Chief Auditor, Mr. Sprague, and after his retirement, and notwithstanding the change of Government, was continued as assistant to the present Provincial Auditor, Mr. Jas. Clancy. The latter spoke in the very highest terms of the services of Mr. Wood.

March 23rd, 1876.—In the list of Lindsay market prices we note: Potatoes, 60c. to 65c.; butter, 15c. to 22c.; cheese, 18c.; eggs, 15c. to 17c.; hay, per quarter, per lb., 4c. to 6c.; beef, per quarter, 82 to 83.

Vol. Terry is ambitious and wishes to be called a town. At the last meeting of their council a motion was passed to that effect.

In Exbridge the Reeve, a magistrate and the editor of The Journal, were fined for not carrying out the snow-by-law. The cases furnished no little entertainment, and everybody has been kept busy shoveling snow since.

March 30, 1877.—(From Orillia correspondent.) Lindsay merchants advertise "cheap coal oil" at 40c. a gallon. Orillia dealers take no credit in selling it at 25c. a gallon.

April 6, Bobcaygeon note: Mr. Boyd's new mill commenced running last week. It is furnished with the most up-to-date machinery that could be procured and its general equipment is of the highest class.

Mr. Robert Spier has given up his dry goods business.

Mr. J. Howden has this week put a stage on the road to Cannington, stopping at Oakwood and Manilla.

April 13.—Mr. Goldwin Smith was the author of an article of over thirty pages in the Fortnightly Review, in which he endeavors to point out to Canadians that it would be for their own good to unite with United States. He says Canadian nationality is a lost cause, and that ultimate union with the States is morally sure.

April 18th.—(Cambay correspondent.) The home of Mr. R. Moffat was burglarized lately and \$900 belonging to the township of Fenelon, of which Mr. Moffat is treasurer, was taken. A reward of \$400 is offered for the arrest of the thief.

April 20.—A baseball club has been organized in town and named the "Unknowns". The following are the officers: Thos. Fee, capt.; Thos. Burrows, pres.; J. Miller, sec.; John Dwyer, treas.

A maskanogone was shown us lately measuring 4 feet 3 inches long; 9 inches in diameter, 23 inches in circumference, and weighing 34 1-2 lbs.

A Cavalry Brigade has been organized and every morning the members indulge in a healthy canter.

Mr. Justice Burton entertained the members of the bar at the Benson house on Tuesday.

A juvenile baseball club, to be known as the Wideawakes, has been organized. The officers are as follows: Sam White, capt.; Dan Salsby, sec.; Billy Veitch, treas.

The steamer Vanderbilt made her first trip to Fenelon on Monday last. This is the earliest season that has occurred for fourteen years.

The Victoria Spring Assizes opened on Tuesday last before Mr. Justice Burton. Among the jurors we notice Thos. Beal, D. S. Cornell, P. Duck, O. Carimichael, and others. Among the members of the bar present were J. F. Dennistoun, J. A. Burton, J. D. Armour, Q. C. etc.

May 4.—Musakoka. Several gold nuggets were found lately at Grayhurst. One of the owners of the property was offered \$1,000 for an eighth of an acre, and \$15,000 for two acres. Considerable excitement prevailed.
