



Use Big Tile

It pays better to use big tile than to use small tile. The smallest tile being used by any of the farmers now is four-inch tile, while some years ago it was common to find farmers using tile as small as two and a half inches in diameter. Then they abandoned that and began to use none smaller than four-inch. I use none smaller than five-inch, and these I are only in the laterals, writes C. C. Porter in Farmer's Review. For the main lines I use only 8 and 10-inch tiles. Really it is much better to use the larger tiles, nore and the results are much better. Just think about it. The additional cost is only the cost of the tile. It sosts just as much to dig a ditch for the smantile as for the large tile, and it costs the same to in tile laying rather than the material.
