**Some Old Bank Bills.**

There are yet some thrifty people in this county who have not acquired confidence in banks, and prefer to store their savings in a stocking. One of our leading business men bears a convincing illustration of the fact the other day, when a farmer who called to liquidate an account handed over a couple of dozen \$5 bills by the "Ten Shilling" tokens of the Bank of Toronto, the Bank of Commerce and Ontario Bank of Canada Bank, between the years 1849 and 1866—prior to Confederation. The bills had been issued at Toronto, Belleville, Oshawa, Ottawa and Alexandria. The vignettes are creditable specimens of engraving, and some of the issues are superior and more attractive than those issued by some of our banks to-day.
