The Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway Bonuses, versus Municipalities Takirg Stock.

(To Ed. of The Post.)

Sir,-As your columns are open for discussion of public affairs, and as this question is soon to be brought somewhat prominently before the public, it might not be out of place to have it discussed from as many points of view as possible. The various municipalities through which the proposed road passes are asked for bonuses. Now, it must be plain that if the scheme is to be a paying investment, and if the public are to contribute towards the enterprise and their money is to be invested, why not let the ones contributing share in the returns. It must occur to the minds of every observant person that the days of bonusing railroads by municipulities is a thing of the past. There is some excuse for bonusing a road to come into a new district where there is no railroad, but such is not the case in this instance. No person has a right, or as far as I know, a desire to interfere with any company of individuals who see fit to put their money into a railway project, but when they ask for public money the Now, the distance from Lindsay to

Burketon is 26 miles; the government grant at \$3,200 per mile would amount to \$83,200. As we are aware, the country through which the proposed line passes presents no engineering difficulties, and the road should be built and completed, ready for the rolling stock, for between \$8,000 and \$9,000 per mile. This makes a total of \$234,-000 for the 26 miles from Lindsay to Burkton. By subtracting the government grant of \$83,200, which is now on hand, this would leave \$150,800 to be subscribed as preference stock by the municipalities interested. They having this much stock, would be the Railway Co. and the owners of the road. The municipalities could borrow this money at 3 per cent.; this would be \$4,524 for the first year, and then there would be a reduction each year in the interest and principal according to the earnings of the

Assuming that the municipalities would make as good a deal with the C.P.R. as others have done under the same tircumstances, and that the C. P.R. would operate the road and give to the municipalities 40 to 45 per cent. of the gross earnings, which should be from \$17,000 to \$20,000 per year, the portion due the municipalities at 40 per cent. would be \$6,800 per year, which, after paying the interest, would leave a balance of over \$2.276 to pay off the principal.
