THE LOCAL TURKEY AND FOWL INDUSTRY

A Great Increase in the Business Over Past Years.

Very few of our readers are aware of what has been going on in this town for the past month in the turkey and fowl trade. The business of dressing turkeys, geese, ducks and chickens for the Englishman's holiday table, which has been in a partly experimental stage up to this time, has now assumed far greater proportions than ment. any one could have foreseen.

Flavelle Bros., of this town, who have been for many years large buyers and shippers of all kinds of farm produce, conceived the idea about two years ago that there ought to be a good opening in the British markets | for Canadian poultry. During the two past seasons this firm have been making trial shipments, with the object of at the same time be made profitable. The matter having passed the experimental stage, Messrs. Flavelle brothers determined this season to push the business to its fullest extent. With that object in view, buyers have been sent out in every direction within a radius of fifty miles of Lindsay, and all the marketable fowl of every desscription have been bought up alive and shipped here.

With the of ject of having uniformity in the finished article, it was found to be necessary that the slaughtering and packing should be done in one place and under skilled supervision. and for that purpose a large amount of room was necessary. The Egg warehouse belonging to the firm, in the east ward, and the skating rink, were used for that purpose, and for some three week several hundred men, women and boys have been working almost day and night preparing the fowl for shipment.



Suspected Drowning of a Citizen Miss





Altogether it may be assumed that the Canadians have merely gone through the usual erperience of soldiers aboard a troop. ship, just the same as they are now taking pot luck with the regulars on the way to the front.
