As a curbside promotion, Central Smith began to offer a variety pack — six one-litre offerings of different flavours, all for \$30. Each week, they'd mix up the pack with different flavours.

"It really caught on," Scates says. People would drop in, maybe to get them for a cottage weekend or a dinner party, and find they liked new flavours they never tried before.

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
