Ward 2 Coun. Kathleen Seymour-Fagan, one of the advisors on the relief fund, said the need is still great in the community.

"Bobcaygeon continues to need help and our community and neighbours have responded with donations so we can help each other. The outreach remains totally confidential and people continue to apply," she said.

The relief fund has partnered with 15 community organizations who are assisting throughout the community.

Funds have been donated by residents in Bobcaygeon and across Kawartha Lakes as well as local businesses and summer residents from the Peterborough area, Cobourg, Toronto and beyond.

Ann Adare, another advisor on the project, said donors recognize that the need for support will continue for the unforeseen future and contributions to the relief fund continue to come in.

"Our community has always been there for one another. Sometimes we give and sometimes we need a helping hand," she said.

Heading into the holiday season during the pandemic, the relief fund is asking area residents to consider giving to the fund to help someone in need this year.
