

done, expand your horizons: take macro shots of toenails, ear canals, noses, belly button lint.

Rooftop yodeling: Take up yodeling as a hobby; training courses are available on the Internet. The best yodeling can only be done from heights. Challenge them to find matching socks on that huge shelf we adults call a floor. If you live alone, hide your own socks late at night in pitch black.

Write a novel: C'mon, you know you've always wanted to. Git 'er done! Writing a novel is hours and hours of fun, complete with hair-pulling, anguished moans, self-doubt, and heavy drinking (which helps your beer cap or wine cork art hobby). When your magnum opus is finally finished (likely by Lockdown 25.0), don't subject yourself to the trauma of rejection letters from publishers. (Unless your hobby is collecting such letters.)
