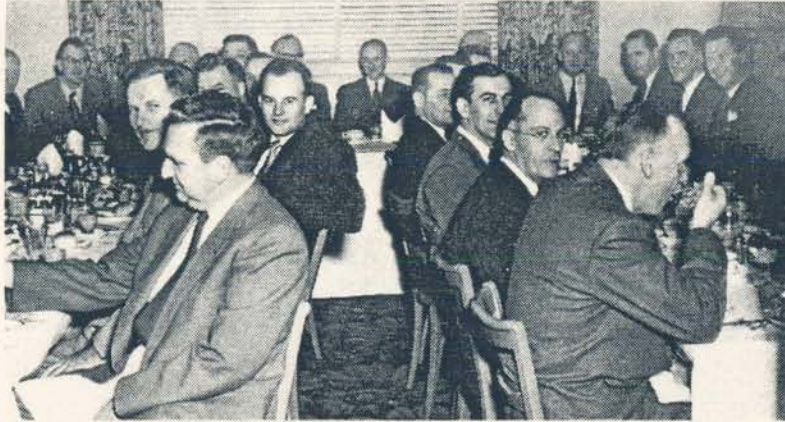


THOROLD ENGINEERS HOLD 9th ANNUAL DINNER
