One hundred and three years of continuous artillery service will go when the Cobourg Armories is closed.

## "Quite A Blow" Says Heenan



Sunday night, the 14th Field Battery of the 50th Field Regiment turned their freedom over to the town for safe-keeping, following the announcement by Defense Minister Leo Cadieux that it was one of the 16 Armories to be closed in Ontario.

Mayor Heenan said Monday that while he has not discussed it with Council yet, he personally felt the Armories closing and end of the militia here has the effect of a double-barrelled shotgun, particularly with the closing of the base here.

'It is the last connection with the services this town has: the last bit of military character.

"It leaves us with no air and army cadets. These two military announcements within the last five months are quite a blow. I think that the distribution of these closings should take in more of the larger centres, who have other outlets, to even out the effect," the mayor said.
