BETHESDA NORTH CHURCH

Located on Lot 30 Concession 9 in Haldimand Township, the existing church replaced a clapboard church built in 1856 by Presbyterians. In 1882, a Scottish craftsman, William Fitzgerald from Peterborough, completed the brick church for \$3031.09. The spire was removed in 1917.

In 1990, Bethesda North was leased by the Roman Catholic parish of Roseneath from the United Church of Canada. The congregation and Haldimand LACAC had it designated a heritage property in 1992. The interior has been carefully restored and

the exterior brickwork is gradually being repointed and repaired with help from the designated property grant program.

On the western hillside are buried many early residents of the area known as the Scottish Settlement. The surrounding countryside was settled between 1850 and 1860 by Scottish immigrants.

Grafton Station


In 1856 the Grand Trunk Railway was opened through Haldimand Township. Grafton Station continued to operate until the mid 1960's.
