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### The Day and the Date.

A correspondent asks us for a method of finding the day of the week upon which any given date falls. For example, which day of the week was 15th February in the year 1899?

The only method of which we are aware is the following. Take the last two figures of the year and divide their sum by 4 disregarding any remainder. To this result add the date of the month, then add one of the following figures according to the month of the year: 1-2-3-4-5-6-7-8-9-10-11-12-13-14-15-16-17-18-19-20-21-22-23-24-25-26-27-28-29-30-31. Divide the total by 7. The remainder gives the day of the week, if there is no remainder, the day is Saturday.

Example: Today is the 21st of January, 1926.  
Add 1 and 6. The sum is 7.  
Divide by 4—Result 1.  
Then add 21—22.  
Again add 1 (1st month)—23.  
Total—26.  
Divide 26 by 7—Remainder 5.  
5th day of week is Thursday.

In a similar manner the actual day of the week upon which any great event happened in the past, or any important announcement for the future will take place, may be worked out accordingly, as long as the day of the month and the year are known.

Her husband, the late Rev. Frank C. Keam was an old Baltimore boy, and was educated at Cobourg High School and Victoria College. Twelve years ago Mr. Keam retired from the active ministry and had since resided in Toronto.

After an illness extending over two years, an estimable lady, Mrs. Wolfram, wife of Mr. Frank Wolfram, died at the family home in Centreton on Friday night. ### The Late George Guillet, ex-M.P.

This community, in the death in Port Hope on Wednesday, January 20th, of George Guillet, ex-M.P., has lost a distinguished and valiant citizen and we extend deepest sympathy to the immediate family circle thereby bereaved. The disposition and character of the late Mr. Guillet was such, as to make his death even at the great age of 86 years, a source of keen sorrow to those who were privileged to have the pleasure of intimate association with him. He maintained until his last illness, that lively interest in public affairs which characterized his whole career and which will perpetuate his memory in his native Town of Cobourg for many years to come.

Mr. Guillet was a man of splendid ability, fine address and kindly disposition. During his earlier years he was an outstanding merchant of Cobourg, and as such a man of integrity who was generally esteemed. He was also actively associated in all laudable church and community movements.

George Guillet, was born at Cobourg in 1840, being a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Guillet. He received his education in Cobourg Public Schools and Victoria College. At the age of 32 he was elected to the Town Council and was Mayor for the years 1876, 77, 78 and 79. Though offered a fifth term as Mayor, Mr. Guillet was prevailed upon by his fellow Conservatives to leave municipal politics. He contested West Northumberland in 1879 unsuccessfully against the late John Field. He was then elected a Commissioner of the Cobourg Town Trust, and served in that position for four years. In a Federal bye-election required necessary by the death of the Hon. James Cockburn, Q.C., M.P., Mr. Guillet was opposed by the late Dr. Waters as Liberal Standard bearer, and was elected to Parliament on Dec-19, 1881. From that date until 1900 inclusive he was six times elected to Parliament for West Northumberland.

Of late Mr. Guillet has resided in Toronto and Port Hope. He is survived by his widow, before her marriage, Miss Fanny A. Biekle of Cobourg, by two brothers, Prof. Cephas Guillet of Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., and Mr. Edwin Guillet, Cobourg, and by two sisters, Mrs. L. B. Scott, Norfolk, Virginia, and Miss Elise Guillet, Port Hope.
