Cooper seeks public school trusteeship

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David Cooper has added his name to the municipal ballot list for school board trustee representing Alnwick-Haldimand,

Hamilton Township, and the Town of Cobourg.

The e Cobourg resident says he is straightforward, tells it like it is, and has a genuine desire to improve the delivery of education in the area.

The 47-yearold father of young two daughters admits he is expert when it comes to Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board policy or politics, but he is willing to wade right in and learn everything

necessary.

"I hear horror stories from my nieces and nephews: by Halloween they're out of paper and pencils," he said, noting he wants to see a shift in focus — making the bottom line less of a priority,

and providing quality education more of a priority.

"The people who have been running school the system know everything about the botline tom They know the value of nothing but the cost of everything," he said.

Mr. Cooper spent 20 years working in restauthe rant business in Toronto, followed by five years in the television film and industry, The restaurant business gave him administrative skills

and listening skills which would serve him well as a trustee, he

"I'm a good listener. Being in the restaurant business for so long I certainly learned how to listen and get people what they want," he said.

Mr. Cooper also described himself as a good listener, said he speaks from his heart, and said he sincerely wants to help people get better education.

"The learning curve will be steep but I'm willing to figure it out," Mr. Cooper said.
