The following preamble and resolution was presented and on motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt was adopted.
Whereas it is the sense of this Board that one who commits a crime in DuPage County, should be arrested and punished for the same, according to the forms of law.
Therefore be it resolved that when a murder is hereafter committed in DuPage County, and the party or parties who may have committed such murder are not under arrest, then and in such case, the Chairman of this Board, any one of the Supervisors and the sheriff or two of them, are hereby authorized, directed and empowered to offer a reward in an amount not exceeding the sum of \$1,000; to be paid upon the arrest and conviction of the party or parties who hereafter commit the crime of murder in DuPage County.
