Joliet, Ill., May 18. - Special Telegram. - An important condemnation case is being tried in the Will Coun. corn. ty Circuit Court. The case comes from Dupage County on a change of venue and involves about one hundred acres wanted for the Chicago Drainage Canal. In the first trial the owners of the land were awarded \$150 an acre for their land. drainage commissioners did not complain, but deposited the money subject to the order of the owners and went to work to dig through the land. INCOME TAX IS ILLEGAL.

A Dispatch from Washington, dated May 20, to the News says:

The Supreme court of the United States today declared the income tax law to be unconstitutional.

The vote on the income tax re sulted: Five against the constitution ality of the law to 4 for the law. Those against the law were Chief Justice Fuller and Justices Field. Gray, Brewer and Shiras; for the law, Justices Harlan, White, Brown and Jackson.

Chief Justice Fuller read the opinion and the conclusions of the court are as follows:

"1. We adhere to the opinion already announced that taxes on real estate being indisputably direct tax es, taxes on the rents or income of real estate are equally direct taxes.

ty, being a direct tax within the meaning of the constitution, is therefore unconstitutional and void, because not apportioned according to representation, all those sections constituting one entire scheme of taxa-
