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

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

EXPLOSION AT FULLERSBURG.

Full Particulars Concerning the Catastrophe of Last Week.

About two o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, the quiet hamlet of Fullersburg was shaken as by an earthquake by the bursting of the large boiler of the York Mills. Looking in the direction of the mill, the inhabitant beheld a shower of bricks, pieces of iron, corn and timbers which had been thrown into the air by the explosion.

When asked as to the explosion, Mr Graue, the proprietor of the mill, said he could not determine the exact cause, though it was doubtless due to a weak place in the boiler. The boiler was supposed to be perfectly safe, having been tested by an expert, last fall. A rumor was current that the explosion was due to a scarcity of water in the boiler, but Mr. Grave made the following statement to a reporter. "The report that the explosion was caused by lack of water in the boiler is false. The boiler was full and had just been started about five minntes previous to the explosion, after being shut down for noon. We had been using water power ever since February, until this morning, when we started to use steam. We had run all the morning without any accident and this afternoon's others. 


