J. L. Donnelly was arrested last Saturday morning on five warrants sworn out by M. Hengels, T. Rooney, P. Croak, F. Ebert, and B. Ruffles, who charge him with having obtained money under false pretenses. Donnelly has been working a clothing club scheme, and the complainants allege they have paid him money and that he failed to deliver the clothes. After examination Donnelly was bound over to the criminal court. He furnished bail and was released.—La Grange News.

The famous Mrs. O'Leary, who will go down to history as the indirect cause of the great Chicago fire, is dead. It is still a mooted question whether or not her refractory cow kicked over the lamp. There is no dispute that the fire originated in the O'Leary barn on DeKoven street, but the O'Leary family claim to have been in bed at the time, and have testified that they had no lamp in the barn that night. In spite of this Mrs. O'Leary and her cow still remain before the world as the cause of the great conflagration, and it is doubtful if this impression will ever be obliterated.

At Turner last Sunday morning Patrick Mulecay, a member of St. Mary's Catholic church, went to the church to pay his pew rent. Formerly it had always been \$3, but since the society moved into its new place of worship the rent was raised to \$4. This Mulecay did not know, and an altercation took place. Father Goulay became enraged and struck Mulecay twice with his fist, knocking him down. Mulecay intends to prosecute Father Goulay, but he can get no justice of the peace to issue the warrant. The affray took place in the church in the presence of part of the congregation.

John Parker, an Englishman who has worked for Major Thorne for over a quarter of a century, became tired of life, and on Saturday last was ushered into the presence of his Maker by the aid of about twenty-five cents worth of morphine, taken some time before dinner. His condition was discovered at noon and a physician summoned, but the drug had so far operated that nothing could be done that was effective and he died about midnight. He was buried Monday. So far as known he had no relatives in this country. He leaves no property, although it is said he had considerable a year or so ago. He is supposed to have been about 60 years of age.—Independent.
