In the greater number of the Roman Catholic churches in Chicago last Sunday it was publicly and officially announced that the pope had placed under ban of condemnation the Knights of Pythias, Sons of Temperance and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

And now comes the report that ex President Harrison has said: "I am not a candidate for the presidency, have not been, will not be, I do not want the office, and will not accept it." This leaves the field to two "favorite sons"—McKinley and Reed, with numerous "dark horses" watching and weighing.

In the house of representatives, Mr. Bryan presented a petition from a building and loan association of this district asking an amendment to the law so as to require the secretaries of such association to furnish to the county clerk a list of stockholders, their residences, number of shares held, etc., of their respective associations.

An exchange recently published the following bit of sound logic: There is hardly a week passes by in which some fakir doesn't come along with some advertising scheme to catch our merchants. Last week it was a woman with a "Trade Review" of some sort—write you up and sell you all the papers you want for five cents each. These papers were for distribution among the "people who don't take newspapers." This week it was an "advertising fan"—a cheap piece of cardboard with a cheap wooden handle, the space on which was sold to enterprising merchants. We have only one word to say—better stick to your home newspaper. It stands by you and your town fifty-two weeks in the year.

It is now a well settled fact that the tax levy was sufficient, and that there was not a particle of reason for Governor Altgeld to call the legislature together on account of any prospective deficiency. The auditor's first report figured out a deficiency of \$454,000 on the 1st of July, 1897. But he has revised his figures and estimates now the deficiency \$200,000. And he puts down among the liabilities: "Expenses special Thirty-ninth General Assembly, \$150,000." According to his latest estimate, if Altgeld had not called a special session there would have been a deficiency of only \$50,000, which is too small to bother about. For the purpose of ventilating his crazy theories and satisfying his personal ambition, the governor has created this deficiency of \$150,000, by unnecessary calling the legislature together. Verily, Altgeldism is expensive as well as dangerous to the people.

A Missillon, Ohio, special of July 19th, says that J. S. Coxe claims to have information proving that the election of President Cleveland was the result of a bargain between Cleveland and an association of New York bankers, whereby the latter furnished the democratic committee with \$1,000,000 in return for an anti-silver policy. Congressman Sibley of Pennsylvania is quoted as having furnished the facts to C. H. Miller, a Canton manufacturer. Mr. Sibley assumed to speak with knowledge. He said that a poll of the votes-completed three weeks before election in 1892 by the Bankers' Association of New York City brought out the fact that the reelection of Harrison was assured and that the new house of representatives would be strongly democratic. This phase of affairs did not suit them, so they sent a delegation to Mr. Cleveland and told him if he would agree to certain propositions they would put \$1,000,000 into the campaign. The proposed policy, which was agreed to by Mr. Cleveland, embraced

ed three propositions—the repeal of the silver purchasing clause of the Sherman law, the vetoing of and opposition to any silver legislation that would look to free coinage or a larger use of silver, and the issue of gold bonds. Mr. Cleveland consented that the money should be raised on the conditions made, and his subsequent official actions are regarded by Mr. Sibley as proof that he has delivered the goods.—Tribune.

HORR-HARVEY DEBATE.

The money discussion at the Illinois Club may or may not result in settling the question of the relative debating powers of Messrs. Horr and Harvey, says the Chicago Post, but it is not likely to stir up national interest. If the attendance at the opening is an indication of the local interest, this is scarcely lukewarm.

The fact is that the free silver bogie has been so thoroughly exposed by thinkers like Lawrence Laughlin that it no longer frightens anybody. It was only a jackass in a lion's skin after all.

The future of political parties in this country is not to turn upon the issues raised by "Coin's Financial School." For all political purposes the free silver dogma is as dead in the United States to-day as the home-rule doctrine in England. Both are out of the range of practical politics.

WOMEN, BLOOMERS AND MEN.

Probably too much attention is being paid to the vexed bloomer controversy, says the Chicago Record, but this does not mean that the controversy is not likely to continue. It will go on until either the costume changes or the popular point of view changes, so that, from growing familiarity, the bifurcated thing no longer seems strange. Whatever the outcome the bloomer discussion is here to stay.

Note the recent flurry in Canada, when a member of a board of education tried to prevent school-teachers from wearing the new costume. Note also a similar effort to abolish the bloomer by calling it an article of "male attire." Note also that these efforts have failed lamentably. While the worthy rumpus continues the new bicycle costume, advancing firmly and boldly on its two legs, is working its way into public toleration.

The accusation that the new garment is "male attire" may be parried now by calling attention to the fact that as it is already worn by women as much as men it is no more man's attire than it is woman's. To cap the climax, there comes an edict of the west park board of Chicago prohibiting racing wheelmen from wearing their meager racing suits. This last looks like an insidious flank attack of the advocates of bloomers.

Can it be that the new woman, having appropriated male attire for herself, means to drive the new man into petticoats and stays.

THE LOVEJOY MONUMENT.

The legislature of Illinois has appropriated \$25,000 for the erection of a monument to the memory of Elijah P. Lovejoy, conditioned upon the raising \$12,500 more by the Lovejoy Monument association before the 1st of next January. The proposed site for the monument is in the Alton City Cemetery, upon a bluff overlooking the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, the altitude of which will make it a landmark.

No appeal ought to be necessary to secure this small amount at once. The story of Lovejoy, of his fidelity to the cause of freedom, his heroism, lofty moral courage, and martyrdom is familiar to every schoolboy. With nothing to gain but the approval of his own conscience he struggled for liberty of thought and speech and laid down his life for that great principle. Almost his dying words were: "But, gentlemen, as long as I am an American citizen, and as long as American blood runs in my veins, I shall hold myself at liberty to speak, to write, and to publish whatever I please on any subject, being amenable to the laws of my country for the same." It was for these principles he laid down his life. Since his death they have been vindicated. The cause for which he struggled has triumphed, and triumphed by more radical remedies

than even he proposed, for he went no further than urging gradual emancipation of the slave. The time has come when any man can speak or write what he thinks, amenable to the laws of his country. In this state, therefore—the state of Lincoln and Grant—a fitting monument should be erected. The sum asked for is small. Remittances should be made to John E. Hayner, Alton, Ill., president of the Alton Savings Bank, who is the treasurer of the association.

WEATHER CROP BULLETIN.

Although the rainfall during the past week was light in the southern section the average for the state was nearly twice the normal fall, which, with temperature above the normal, has made the week an exceptionally favorable one. Corn has made remarkable progress and is generally in the silk, with ears shooting in many early fields. Oats harvest has been delayed by the rains in northern counties, also the threshing of rye, wheat and the early cut oats. Late potatoes, gardens, and pastures are generally much improved by the rains and late potatoes promise a good yield. In the central and southern sections fruit is very plentiful and trees are bending under their burden. Plowing is general in all southern counties and has begun in the central. Water has become more plentiful, wells, springs, tiles and streams are filling once more, which is much desired.

NORTHERN SECTION.

The past week has been highly favorable to the farmers of the northern section. Frequent heavy showers, with high temperatures have been of great benefit. The soil is thoroughly soaked, and wells, springs, tiles and streams are filling. In a few northwest and central counties the storms were severe and some damage was done by wind, lightning and hail, but corn blown down or shredded by hail will no doubt quickly recover. The general condition of the plant is highly favorable. Oats harvest has been delayed by the rains and some fields are lodged by high winds, rust also appears in some of the shocked grain. A few days of dry weather will admit of the finishing of the harvest and cause threshing to be general. Potatoes, gardens and pastures are greatly improved, early potatoes will even receive some benefit and the late crop promises well.
