 Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage county at an adjourned meeting held at the court house in the city of Wheaton, on Monday the 6th day of January, A. D. 1896. All members were present.
 On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, the following resolution was adopted:
 Resolved that a reward of five hundred dollars be offered by DuPage county, for the arrest and turning over to the proper officer of DuPage county, Illinois, of Charles H. Smith, alias "Cigarette Charlie," and also five hundred dollars for the arrest and turning over to the proper officer of DuPage county, Illinois, of the man known as "Al," both of said men being wanted for the murder of Edward Ott, on December 11th, 1894, at Wheaton, Ill.
 Said rewards to be paid respectively upon the proper identification of said men respectively by officials and witnesses from said DuPage county.
 On motion of Supervisor McClintock the following preamble and resolution was adopted:
 Whereas the county of DuPage, Ill., has offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest of each of the supposed murderers of Edward Ott, and have not yet been able to apprehend said murderers, now be it
 Resolved, by the board of supervisors of DuPage county, Illinois, that the chairman of said board be and is hereby authorized to call upon the governor of the state and ask for state aid by additional reward.
 Supervisor Christie moved that the report of the committee of court house and grounds, as to making addition to the clerk's office and recommending putting another story over the present offices be adopted and that the eyes and nose be called on the motion. The eyes and nose were called resulting as follows: Ayes, 7; nays, 4. The motion was declared carried. Those voting aye were Supervisors Bartlett, Chandler, Hamerschmidt, McClintock, Anderson, Barnard and Betts. Those voting no were Supervisors Fischer, Bender, Christie and Blodgett.
 On motion of Supervisor Christie the claim of Kane county for burying Frank Halbe, a pauper, was disallowed and the clerk of the board was directed to notify the county clerk of Kane county that said pauper was not a resident of DuPage county.
 On motion of Supervisor Bender the committee on court house and grounds was instructed to employ an architect to make plans for improvements on the clerk's office, including gas machine for lighting the offices, and that they obtain bids therefor, and have full power to act in making said improvements.
 On motion of Supervisor Chandler the following report of the committee on claims was adopted:
