REPORT OF GRAND JURY. To the Hon. Clark W. Upton, Judge of the Circuit court of said DuPage county: We, the grand jurors for the March term of said circuit court submit the following report. We have disposed of all cases presented for our consideration, and have returned into court all true bills, and no bills found.

We have visited the county farm, and note with pride the improvements thereon. The inmates have a good home and every indication points to kind treatment on the part of the superintendent and wife towards them. We find the farm self supporting. We would recommend electric lights at the poor house and telephone connections. We find the court house in a delapidated condition. Rotten brick and leaning walls were observed. The business of the county demands more office and vault room. We would strongly recommend the erection of a new court house without further expenditure of money for additions or repairs on the present buildings.

Here is some good, sensible talk taken from the Hillsborough Journal, which we cannot refrain from reprinting, and which we request some of our people to read and ponder well: The growing towns these close days are those that contain men of push and enterprise who, instead of loaning their money out on "snatch-em-quick" mortgages, use it to the benefit of themselves and the city they live in, by encouraging all laudable enterprises, investing in enterprises that will boom the town by furnishing advantages that it does not have, and also furnish employment to labor. One such individual, although he may not be worth \$10,000, is actually a greater benefit to a town than a dozen others worth \$10,000 a piece, who keep it to look at, and in order to save a cent or two ransack a county or two to see if they can't get their trifling supplies a cent or two cheaper than they can at home.

Whenever unusual prosperity in a town becomes manifest, inquiry as to the cause is made. Years ago we were tolerably well acquainted with the principle citizens of Downers Grove, and noticed that in every enterprise—important or trivial—they combined their influence, their energy and their cash and made it a success. It was refreshing to see the unanimity which characterized them in every undertaking. They did not stop long to quibble about expense or whether it would "pay" in dollars and cents, but each one put his shoulder to the wheel and pushed for the honor and glory of Downers Grove. This preserving policy is bearing fruit, and inside of ten years Downers Grove will be the largest suburban town between Chicago and Aurora.—Naperville Clarion.

His son died but a month ago, and on Wednesday, the father was laid at rest by the side of his son in Lyonsville cemetery.
