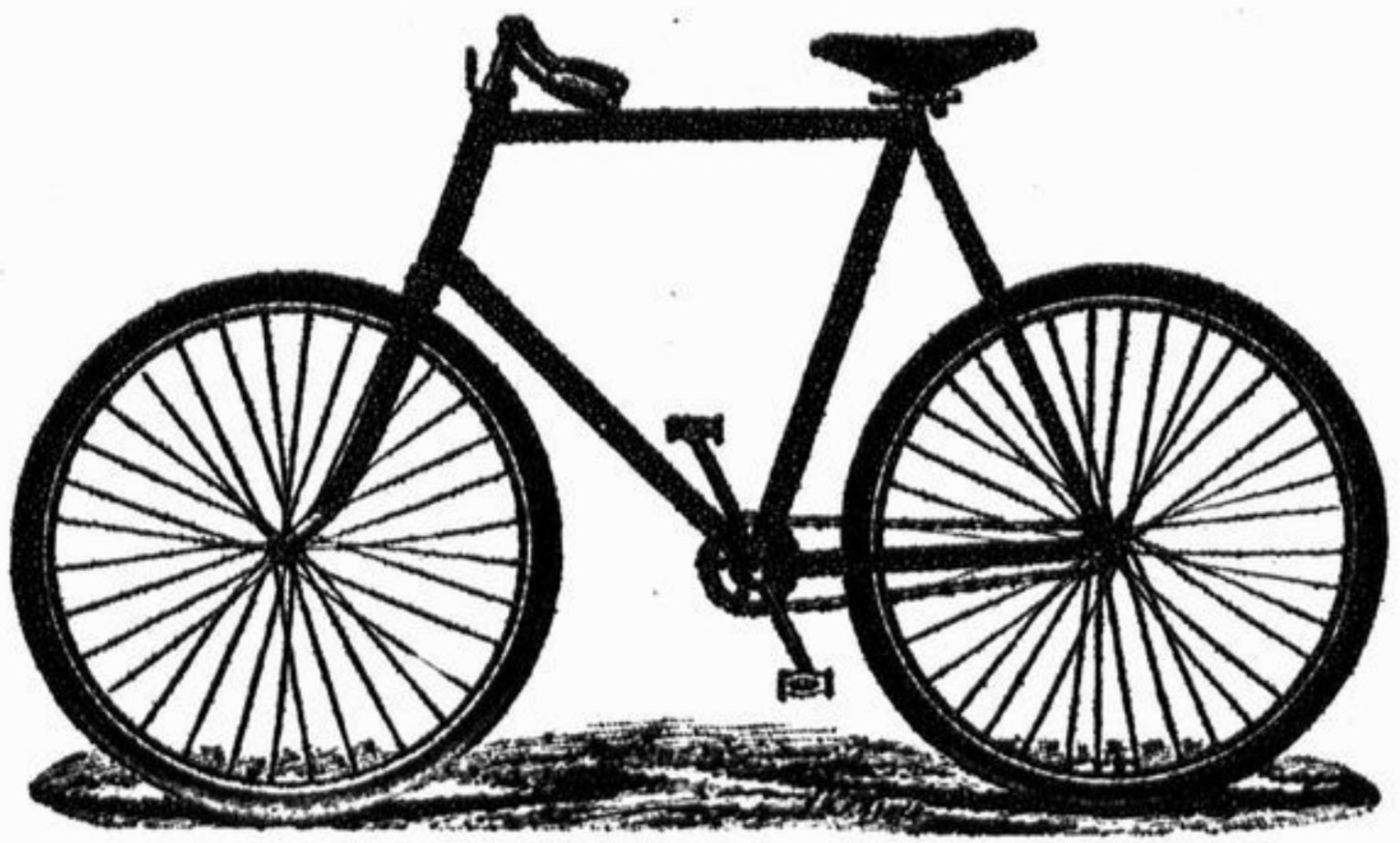

Milton S. Ellsworth died at his home in Wheaton Monday of cystitis. He had been confined to the house for the past four months and on Thursday submitted to an operation, performed by Dr. C. B. Owen, chief surgeon of the Chicago and Northwestern railway, assisted by Dr. Vanderhoff of Wheaton. Mr. Ellsworth was born in Troy, N. Y., Sept. 8, 1859, and came to Illinois when eight years of age. WHEATON.

Last week some of the dog catchers appointed by the city, having secured several canines, went over to the fair grounds with a view of making some arrangements for establishing a dog pound, and while there in some manner—how does not clearly appear—the box stalls on the north side of the enclosure got on fire and the entire line of buildings from the gate to the north west corner of the grounds, were burned, including the secretary's office and the building for the accommodation of the ladies. There does not seem to be any very clear idea as to where the responsibility for the fire rests, but one thing is certain, the buildings are gone and will have to be replaced.
