medicines shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00.

That any person hawking or peddling any other article not enumerated above shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00.

That each and all persons exhibiting any circus or menagerie shall pay a license of \$20.00 for each day or part thereof, that the same is exhibited.

That each person giving or exhibiting any theatrical, show, or amusement, other than a menagerie or circus (where a fee for admission thereto is charged) shall pay a license of \$5.00 for each and every exhibition; provided, however, that all shows, theatricals and exhibitions, given solely for public benefit or charitable objects, shall not be required to pay a license.

Sec. 6. That licenses granted for a year, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be from May 1st, to and including April 30th, next following; and all yearly licenses shall expire on the 30th day of April, next following the granting thereof; and no reduction of fees shall be made on account of licenses being granted for a fractional part of a year or day.

Sec. 7. The provisions of this ordinance shall not be deemed to apply to farmers selling products of their own farm, nor to the taking of orders, for goods, by regular dealers for future delivery, nor persons selling or peddling milk within the limits of said village.

Sec. 8. That each and every person who shall peddle or hawk or be engaged in the business of auctioneering within the limits of the village of Downers Grove, or who shall give any theatricals, shows or other exhibitions within the limits of said village, without first obtaining a license therefor, as provided in sections four and five of this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$3.00 nor more than \$50.00 and costs of prosecution, for each and every offense committed; and any person found violating any section of this ordinance may be arrested on view, and prosecuted agreeably to the provisions of chapter four of the revised ordinances of the said village of Downers Grove, passed January 31st, 1894.

Sec. 9. That the president of said village may in his discretion, revoke at any time, any license granted, pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 10. That sections 110, 111, 112, 113, 114, 115, 116, 117, 118, of chapter 12, of the revised ordinances of said village, passed January 31st, 1894, and an ordinance passed by the president and board of trustees of said village, on the 17th day of June, 1895, are each and all hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and legal publication.

Passed and approved by the president of and the village board of trustees this 6th day of July, A. D. 1896.
