peal an ordinance of said village, passed June 17th, 1895: Be it ordained by the president and coard of trustees of the village of Downers Grove, in the county of DuPage, and state

Section 1. That each and every person, who shall, either as principal or agent, peddle or hawk, within the limits of the village of Downers Grove, any goods, wares or merchandise, shall, before doing the same, obtain a licease as a peddler or hawker, as provided and specified, in sections 4 and 5, of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. That each and every person who shall engage in the business of an auctioneer, within the limits of the said therefor, as provided in sections 4 and 5 of

this ordinance. Sec. 8. That each and every person, before giving any theatricals, exhibition, show or other amusement, within the limits of said Village of Downers Grove. (where a fee for admission thereto is charged) shall obtain a license therefor, as provided in sections 4 and 5 of this ordi-

Sec. 4. That all licenses granted under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be signed by the clerk of said village, who and each license shall specifically set forth the purpose for which it is granted. The clerk of the village shall enter upon a book to be kept for that purpose, all licenses granted by him, together with the

amount of the license fees Sec. 5. That the fees for licenses required by sections one, two and three of this ordinance, shall be as follows, to-wit: That each foot or pack peddler, selling from a valise, trunk, or other receptacle, shall pay a license for one day \$1.00; for

one year \$10,00. That each dry-goods, boot and shoe peddler, selling from a wagon or sleigh, one year, \$20.00.

That each sewing machine, lightningrod, tin, stove or hardware peddler, shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one

That each person peddling meat or fish from wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license for one day \$1.00; for one year \$10.00. That each person peddling kerosene. gasoline, naptha, or other products of

or sleigh, shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00. That each person peddling potatoes,

shall pay a license for one day \$1.00; for one year \$10.00. That each person peddling or selling bakery products, from wagon or sleigh shall pay a license for one day \$1.00; for one year \$10.00.

That each person peddling any other article not enumerated from wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00. That each person peddling drug

medicines shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00.

That any person hawking or peddling any other article not enumerated above shall pay a license for one day \$2.00; for one year \$20.00, That each and all persons exhibiting any circus or menagerie shall pay a license

of \$20.00 for each day or part thereof, that

the same is exhibited That each person giving or exhibiting any theatrical, show, or amusement, other than a menagerie or circus (where a fee for admission thereto is charged) shall pay a license of \$5,00 for each and every exhibition; provided, however, that all shows, theatricals and exhibitions, given solely for public benefit or charitable objects, shall not be required to pay a license.

Sec. 6. That licenses granted for year, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be from May 1st, to and including April 80th, next following; and all yearly licenses shall expire on the 80th day of April, next following the granting thereof; and no reduction of fees shall be made on account of licenses being granted for a fractional part of a year or day.

Sec. 7.
