Downers Grove, June 19th, 1896. Board met in special session, called by President Carpenter for purpose of considering 1st violation of water ordinance, 2nd illegal use of water, 3rd riding bicycles etc. on sidewalks mentioned in the call.

Meeting called to order by President Carpenter. Roll call noted present Trustees Wetten, Hughes, Chivers, Schultz and Bunge. Absent Trustee Moebel.

Violation water ordinance by plumbers was brought up for discussion. It was moved by Trustee Bunge, seconded by Trustee Schultz that matter be left in hands of water committee to investigate and report at next meeting. Carried, all voting aye.

The matter of illegal use of water was brought up after lengthy discussion. It was moved by Trustee Wetten that the village attorney together with the water committee take up matter of illegal use of water prosecute any person or persons who have heretofore or shall hereafter illegally use village water. Upon call same was carried all voting aye.

The matter of riding bicycles etc. upon the sidewalks on being brought up it was moved by Trustee Hughes, seconded by Trustee Schultz, that the present ordinance regarding riding of bicycles be strictly enforced. Carried, all voting aye.

After the examination of the several witnesses present it was moved, seconded and carried that board go into executive session, after which the matter in question being discussed at length, the following resolution was introduced and read:

Whereas, charges have been preferred before the board of trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, Ill., alleging that E. H. Prince has unlawfully connected his private water system with the village water main without proper consent or authority and

Whereas, this board has investigated the charges as preferred it is hereby Resolved, that we exonerate the said E. H. Prince from the continuance use of water from the said Village mains for any considerable length of time, but

WEATHER CROP BULLETIN.

For the week ending July 20, 1896. During the past week the temperature averaged from 3° to 5° daily below the normal and a light frost occurred in a few northeast counties on the 17th. Rain came in light showers in central and southern counties the first of the week and in good general rains on Saturday and Sunday. Much good was done in the northern section, and the results are beneficial over the state as a whole, although some low land will be flooded in central and southern counties and some damage caused to wheat and oats in the shock. Threshing and the ending of oats and timothy harvest, have been pushed rapidly. Hay has been saved in fine condition and shows a fair yield. Oats are proving disappointing in central and north counties, being damaged by rust and bugs. Wheat and rye threshing continues. Pastures, gardens and late potatoes will be much benefited by the timely rains.

NORTHERN SECTION.

The week was somewhat below normal temperature, a light frost occurred in some northeast counties on the morning of the 17th, and practically without rain until Saturday, when fine rains set in, continuing over Sunday. Oats harvest and haying have practically been finished; timothy being saved in fine condition and with the yield generally better than anticipated. Oats are being threshed from some of the earlier fields and are proving but fair with light grain and rusty straw. Rye is generally showing a good yield, and the few wheat fields are turning out quite well. Corn continues to grow nicely, but was needing the late rain; late fields are all laid by. Pastures were showing great need of rain but will no doubt revive rapidly; late potatoes and gardens were also needing rain. The dryness shortened the blackberry crop; early apples are plentiful.

VILLAGE BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

The adjourned meeting from June 1 to June 8 was called to order by President Carpenter. Roll call noted present Trustees Hughes, Schultz, Wetten and Moebel. Absent Chivers and Bunge. Trustee Wetten then reported on matter of insurance and recommended that the following amounts be placed upon the village property: \$3,000 on boiler and engine against explosion. \$3,000 on building against fire. \$300 on village hall against fire. \$800 on south side hose house, cart and hose against fire. \$800 on north side hose house, hose and cart against fire. After some discussion on the subject it was moved by Trustee Moebel, seconded by Trustee Schultz that the board place insurance as follows: \$3,000 on boilers and engines against explosion. \$3,000 on building against fire. \$300 on village hall against fire. \$800 on south side hose house, cart and hose against fire. \$300 on north side hose, cart and hose against fire. Which motion was carried, those voting aye were Trustees Hughes, Schultz, Moebel and Wetten. Trustee Carpenter appointed Trustees Wetten and Moebel to place insurance and decide upon terms and number of years to place same. Mr. Shamer then brought up matter of licenses in village and presented and read an ordinance to repeal all previous ordinances, which was referred to ordinance committee to report at next meeting. President Carpenter then brought up matter of noxious weeds upon certain properties within village, which was left in hands of street commissioner to cause
