THE VOICE OF THE PROPLE.

To the Downers Grove REPORTER:

I have an object lesson in silver which I have carried in my pocket for over years. It is a Mexican silver dollar which I got in Mexico in 1866. At that time it took \$10 in greenbacks to buy five Mexican silver dollars, now after 80 years the conditions have been completely reversed. A \$5 greenback will buy ten Mexican silver dollars. If there was no acknowledged, or fixed standard of value in primary money, how could the conditions, above mentioned, have reversed. Gold remains the same, and is the recognized standard of the commercial world in money, and all other values are measured by it. All other money changes, in accordance to the amount of confidence in a gold redeemer. As long as Mexico kept its silver on a parity with gold, it would buy as much as gold. Now, you buy at half price in Mexico, if you pay in gold or redemption money. When Mexico went into the free and unlimited coinage of silver, gold went out of circulation, and although Mexico produces \$15,000,000 in gold annually, it doesn't circulate, except in some other country. Mexico did all that legislation could do to make the silver dollar equal to gold. It is made a legal tender for taxes of all kinds, debts and duties. How does it work? Merchants put up the price of their goods just double. The government levies double the amount in taxes. When they buy foreign goods, they put up double the amount in silver. Nobody is cheated except the poor laborers who get about the same wages (30 to 50 cents per day) that they did 30 years ago, when silver was equal to gold. If Mexico is such a pros perous country as the "ailver cranks" would have us believe, why don't some your Downers Grove "Bryanites" go there. There is a big demand in Mexico for jack-

It has brought to the surface a lot of "yellow dog" financiers, who were educated in "Coin's Financial School," and think they are leaders of men, when as a matter of fact they couldn't carn \$50 a month at anything and most of them will be looking out for a job after the silver mine owners quit putting" up next week.
