THEIR DUTY ACCOMPLISHED.



With the election of Wm. McKinley Tuesday with the stupendous plurality of the popular vote of over 1,000,000, closes one of the most remarkable political campaigns in the history of the United States.

Understanding fully these issues, and how utterly their own fortunes and those of their posterity depended on dealing with them rightly, once and forever, the American people, at the close of a campaign of unexampled excitement and intensity, have buried Bryan under an avalanche of electoral and popular votes.

The American people have preserved their honesty and their self-respect. They have defeated Bryan overwhelmingly, and have shown the world that they are not a nation of cheats and anarchists.

Those few dejected and weeping-looking individuals who meet on the streets are the remnant of a certain silver party, who as yet do not fully realize that Wm. McKinley has been elected together with a republican congress. They do not quite know "where they are at."

In our shouts of rejoicing over our victory let us not forget the patriotic attitude taken by the genuine old line gold democrats in the campaign and election. They furnished a creditable example and object lesson to all in their lofty and zealous patriotism.

The silver forces polled exactly 130 votes in the two Downers Grove precincts, while the republicans polled 432. Don't look as if the scheme to stampede these precincts for Bryan succeeded.

Next week the REPORTER will publish the tabulated vote of DuPage county by precincts, it having been impossible to get a complete return this week.

Too bad that boy orator couldn't have persuaded the people of this broad land to endorse him and his repudiating-anarchistic platform.

Downers Grove township gave a republican plurality of 311 of a vote of 1467. Can any township in the state best that?

The "Alteged and Personal Liberty" cry must have originated with the convicts; he was so proficient in pardoning.

Now that election is over more attention may be given business matters that have been woefully neglected of late.

It is now conceded by the American people that the crime of '73 deprecidantized Bryan in 1896.

Who is the sorest man in Downers Grove over the result? By-the-way, who is that man called Billy Bryan?

And there was a slight fall of the "beautiful."

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION. By the President of the United States: The people of the United States should never be unmindful of the gratitude they owe the God of nations for his watchful care which has shielded them from disaster and pointed out to them the way of peace and happiness.

There was never any doubt at any time during the campaign of Col. Charles P. Bryan's re-election to represent this, the Kane-Downers district, for the fourth time in the general assembly. His record in that body is an exceedingly enviable one, and he has at all times proven himself a worthy man; therefore, the large vote accorded him was no surprise to any one.

During the last session of the legislature seven important measures introduced by him became laws more than were passed by any other member of that body. Along the line of legislation in the interest of the farming classes, he has always been a leading member. Gov. Fifer, in speaking of Col. Bryan during the campaign said: "He is the best farmer, manufacturer,

hard-working officer; one who has done more to put good laws on our statute books than any one representative I could name. During my term of office as governor, I watched his earnest efforts for such legislation as would most benefit the people of this magnificent district and of the state at large. He has displayed ability in public life that outshines him to higher office than he now holds. I think him worthy to fill the executive chair of this great state."

This high endorsement of Col. Bryan's efforts is exactly in line with the way his constituents regard him in this district. His abilities are duly appreciated by his home people and this recognition of his superior work, together with the fact that he is without exception the oldest member in point of service of the lower house of the assembly, are causing his friends to urge him as a candidate for speaker of that body at the coming session.

Governor Altgeld fortunately has been defeated by a handsome majority, much larger than that which elected him four years ago, and for this we may be abundantly grateful. It may have been that he foresaw defeat when he remained silent regarding the charges made against him by Foran and reiterated by Morrison and feared immediate complications had he tried to face the accusations. But he preferred to remain silent, letting the public draw their own conclusions. Those conclusions were given utterance at the polls Tuesday when the honest voters of Illinois consigned Altgeld and his criminal sympathies and anarchistic tendencies; his free silver and free riot hankering to oblivion so far as politics are concerned in Illinois. Illinois had done nobly if nothing else had been accomplished.

The Illinois general assembly will be strongly republican and therefore a republican U. S. senator to succeed Gen. Palmer, whose term expires next March, is assured. The state senate will consist of 41 republicans and 10 democrats. The house will be composed of 92 republicans, 58 silver democrats, and one gold democrat.
