

Understanding fully these issues, and how utterly their own fortunes and those of their posterity depended on dealing ing else had been accomplished. with them rightly, once and forever, the American people, at the close of a campaign of unexampled excitement and intensity, have buried Bryan under an avalauche of electoral and popular votes. The crimes and follies he championed will not lift their heads again.

The American people have preserved their honesty and their self-respect. They have defeated Bryan overwhelmingly, and have shown the world that they are not a nation of cheats and anarchists.

They have voted that they will not swindle foreigners and will not swindle one another. They have repudiated the repudiators, and put the ineffaceable brand of their condemnation on the brown of Bryan and his accomplice.

It has been settled that the savings bank depositors are not to be robbed of their earnings, and that the laboring man is not to be cheated out of half the reward of his

Capital, no longer timid, will emerge from its hiding places, and give employment to the eager hand of labor.
