RECEIVED THE RETURNS.

The Downers Grove band had a packed house at the Auditorium last Tuesday night to hear the election returns. The crowd went loaded with all sorts of latest improved noise-making machines, including iron-clad lungs, and they used them. The first returns were read by Mr. Slusser at about 7:30, and from that time up until nearly 9 o'clock Wednesday morning the crowd howled themselves hoarse in its enthusiasm. There was a goodly number of ladies present. The crowd while noisy was good natured and well behaved. About 10 o'clock, when the bulletins showed beyond question the victory of Maj. McKinley and sound money a flag draped before the republican presidential and vice-presidential candidates' pictures was drawn aside.
