This is the best financial showing ever made by the village.

President Carpenter wisely suggested the idea of taking some action regarding putting street signs on street corners, stating that a town possessing the progressive and intelligent spirit of the citizens of this village, should have this improvement. Trustee Wetten suggested that a Chicago firm would do this for the village if an advertising privilege was accorded them, but this suggestion was not considered in a favorable light. The defense introduced as evidence these ordinances, and witnesses proving an illegal connection existed; also three witnesses swearing that Prince had admitted to them he had used the water on two or three occasions.

The defense objected to the prosecution under the ordinances submitted; first, to the 1894 ordinance as having been repealed; and second, that the 1895 ordinance had never been properly passed or published. These objections were not sustained by the court. Defense showed that previous to the village water being introduced in the Mometer in the basement of the McIntosh house on June 18th last, connecting with Prince's private pipe, and that on June 18th the meter showed that 12,600 gallons of water had been used.
